should be preserved. Three old graves are marked by rocks along the road nearby.

Further south are the rich farms under the Jordan Valley irrigation project which is divided into three units. The upper outpost lies at the fertile Matthews hay ranch at Arock. The road then takes off through the desert and for miles not a tree or farm can be seen.

At Rome, so named from the rugged sandstone cliffs which are replicas of the ruins of the ancient city, is another oasis spreading along the course of the Owyhee river. At this point the river is a gushing stream. Pearl Duncan's ferry crossed the river where a county bridge now stands. At one time, this site was considered for the location of Owyhee dam.

Find Petrified Bones
Mr. and Mrs. Tom Pollock are the present owners of this precious stone house erected by Duncan. Not long ago they entertained Professor Thurloung and Dr. Stokes of the University of California. Every summer these men and a party of students dig for petrified bones of prehistoric animals in the

sandstone cliffs. They have found bones of the camel, ground sloth and elephant of the Paleozoic period, and left a collection at the Pollock home.

Mrs. Pollock has a coin of pure gold which was found in China Gulch, near the Pollock ranch, where sixty Chinese on route from Silver City gold mines to their native land, were massacred by Indians during the war time period.

Most Isolated Ranch

Further south is the George Harper ranch where Mrs. Harper rules as queen at the "most isolated home in the county." Her nearest neighbor is thirty miles distant. Mr. Harper has charge of the county road work in the McDermitt district.
