

COUNTY SELLS BIG ACREAGE

74,591 ACRES OF LAND HAVE BEEN RESTORED TO TAX ROLLS SINCE OCTOBER.

Sale of county land, on the installment plan, has proved of great benefit to Malheur county, according to J. D. Fairman, county commissioner. Since the first big sale last October, 74,591

acres have been sold and restored to the tax roll. This includes 14,294 acres of land under the Warm Springs irrigation project and 60,297 acres of range and other lands. The lands were sold at low prices and in average years would prove an excellent investment to the farmer and rancher, Mr. Fairman said. However, on account of prevailing low prices for farm produce, a few buyers have requested additional time in which to make 1932 payments. The court has the matter under advisement, said Mr. Fairman. He announced that the sales will continue until all good county land is disposed of. Mr. Fairman was here on business Monday.

KETCHUM WILL MAKE SURVEY ON BROGAN PROJECT

Engineer C. C. Ketchum, at present in charge of the Vale irrigation project for the bureau of reclamation, will begin a survey of the Brogan-Burnt river project sometime this month. The work will start as soon as negotiations are completed whereby the state will agree to share the cost with the bureau of reclamation. The survey will take several weeks and will require a staff of several men. It will decide the feasibility of the proposed Burnt river project which will bring supplemental water to Brogan farm lands at an estimated cost of about a million dollars.
