TURKEY SUPPLY ABOUT AVERAGE, SAYS DIRECTOR

Turkeys to be offered this year for holiday markets by American farmers will be just about as plentiful as they were last year, according to a statement made by Earl Brockman, director of the Northwestern Turkey Growers association. Mr. Brockman released this information Wednesday following his return from Salt Lake where he attended the annual meeting of the board of directors.

"This association, which combines the selling activities of sixty local and county turkey pools through the northwest, has had a remarkable growth since its organization in 1929. Last year the organization handled approximately fifty per cent of the turkeys from the seven northwestern states on a very satisfactory basis.

"The November turkey deal will commence about the first of November and continues for 10 days. Receiving stations will be opened in all of the important turkey districts of the state of Idaho and eastern Oregon. Advance payments will be made to the producers at the time the turkeys are delivered and final payment will be out shortly after Thanksgiving.

"The crop of turkeys in the United States appears, at the present time, to be very similar in volume to the crop for last year. The volume from the state of Texas has a very decided influence on the market due to the fact that that state produces about 1500 carloads of turkeys during the year. However, the Texas turkeys do not compare in quality to those of the Northwest and the turkey grower of the Northwest can pride himself in the fact that he obtains three to five cents a pound more for his turkeys than do the turkey growers in Texas."
