REPEAL MEASURE NOT ENDORSED

BROGAN MEMBER OF TAX LEAGUE
DENIES STATEMENT THAT
LEAGUE ENDORSED REPEAL

Contradicting a report published in a newspaper of the county last week Arden A. Reed of Brogan told The Journal yesterday that the Malheur county tax league did not endorse the proposed repeal of the state prohibition law.

"With particular reference to the repeal measures that will appear on the ballot as No. 312 and 313, the motion voted upon was to the effect that the league recommend that voters vote No. 313, which would be voting against the repeal measure. This motion was defeated. No other action was taken to endorse the repeal question, the only vote being to kill the above motion.

"Personally, I do not believe it fair that the report that the league endorsed the repeal of the dry laws should be allowed to stand unchallenged. It is unreasonable to believe that prohibition can be done away with in Oregon, as provided in the repeal measure, since you are not repealing the state constitutional amendment which prohibits manufacture, sale and transportation of intoxicating liquor, and too with the Volstead law and the 18th amendment still in force.

"There are too many accidents now caused by drunken driving. How are we going to improve the situation by repealing our state enforcement laws, thereby tying the hands of our local officers and further inviting a disregard for law."

Mr. Reed also commented on the questionnaire sent by the league to candidates for county office, requesting them to accept a voluntary reduction in salaries of 20 per cent. "It has been stated," said Mr. Reed, and is probably true that any candidate who acquiesces in this respect, for the purpose of acquiring votes, is violating a state law and is thereby laying himself liable to prosecution."
