If you do, you will vote for Mr. Hoover and for his underlings and "yes men," Steiwer and Butler. P. attempts to dig up out of its mouldering grave the ancient slander that the Democratic party is incapable of constructive leadership. However, if the G. O. P. considers the Hoover policies of the past four years as "constructive leadership," the Democratic party must plead guilty to being incapable of such leadership.

The Democratic party enters this campaign no stranger to the public. The brilliant record of our eight years in power is as a splotch of glorious sunshine against the smutty background of Harding plunder and crime, Coolidge stock market prosperity and Hoover helplessness. Those eight years did two things—they destroyed the falsehood that democracy means hard times and they buried beyond hope of resurrection the fallacy that the party that gave the federal reserve system to the nation is an enemy of business.

Yet our Republican opponents revive these hoary myths in an effort to convince the electorate that they have a monopoly on prosperity and good times. Mr. Voter, can you imagine anything more brazen!

Like a little boy pleading he will be good if his father won't spank him, Mr. Hoover pleads for one more chance to make good in the Presidency.

SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT: KATHRYN CLAYPOOL. Kathryn Claypool has had a wide and varied experience in the educational field and at present is employed as a teacher in the public schools of this county. Educated and trained in educational work, she is especially qualified for the office of county school superintendent.

But what assurance does he give us he will make good on a second trial? Nothing more than his usual empty words and promises. Why should his promises now hold forth when those of four years ago have been cast aside, broken and forgotten?

Let us examine in the bright light of 1932 a few of Hoover's 1928 promises and statements.

AGRICULTURE

"The most urgent economic problem in our nation today is in agriculture. It must be solved if we are to bring prosperity and contentment to one-third of our people directly and to all of our people indirectly. We have pledged ourselves to find a solution . . . An adequate tariff is the foundation of farm relief . . . I would use my office and influence to give the farmer the full benefit of our historic tariff policy . . . A nation which is spending ninety billions a year can well afford an expenditure of a few hundred millions for a workable program that will give to one-third of its population their share of the nation's prosperity . . . This program adapts itself to the various problems . . . It is a definite plan of relief. It needs only the detailed elaboration of legislation and appropriations to put it into force."

How much has Hoover and the Republican "historic tariff policy" helped the farmer with a majority of farm products selling today for LESS than the tariff import duty upon them? Has Hoover kept his pledge? Why, then, believe he will keep those he makes now?

TARIFF

"We have pledged ourselves to make such revisions in the tariff laws as may be necessary to provide real protection against the shifting of economic tides in our various industries. I am sure the American people would rather entrust the perfection (sic) of the tariff to the consistent friend of the tariff than to our opponents, who voted against our present protection to the worker and the farmer."

"Did the Smoot-Hawley tariff bill 'protect the worker and the farmer?' It was the most infamous piece of special privilege legislation ever foisted upon a helpless and trusting public. The voters in Oregon's first congressional district gave their opinion of it when they repudiated Mr. Hawley last May. They didn't want to wait and take a chance on the Democrats nailing his hide to the fence. They did it themselves."

PROSPERITY

"Unemployment in the sense of distress is widely disappearing. We in America today are nearer to the final triumph over poverty than ever before in the history of any land."

This speaks for itself. You farmers just don't know when you're well off and prosperous.

PROHIBITION

"I do not favor the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment. I stand for the efficient enforcement of the laws enacted thereunder . . . Our country has deliberately undertaken a great social and economic experiment, noble in motive and far reaching in purpose . . . Modification of the enforcement laws which would permit that which the Constitution forbids is nullification. This the American people will not countenance."

Today he is not so sure of the nobility of the experiment. From the foregoing firm, unequivocal stand in favor of prohibition and its enforcement Hoover has, in characteristic manner, weakly retreated and hidden behind the mush-and-milk proposition of "re-submission." The Literary Digest poll showed Mr. Hoover and the Republican potentates that a substantial majority of the people favored a change. He now becomes the weak trimmer and straddler with which the American public is so familiar.
