COUNTY QUOTA FOR RED CROSS DRIVE IS \$500

ROLL CALL OPENS ARMISTICE DAY WITH J. A. DAVENPORT IN CHARGE IN COUNTY; RED CROSS SENDS MANY SUPPLIES HERE.

Nyssa, Ontario and Vale units of the Malheur County Chapter of Red Cross are making enthusiastic preparations for the annual Roll Call for membership to be held from Armistice Day to Thanksgiving, November 11-24.

The Thanksgiving delivery was small as most of the birds will not be in market shape until December. A heavy supply is reported in Malheur county.

COUNTY, STATE FAVOR REPEAL; INCOME TAX WINS

Results in the county vote on the thirteen ballot measures did not follow the trend in the state in all instances. However Malheur county voted with Oregon on repeal of the state prohibition law, income tax and hydro-electric bill which are assured success. County and state swatted the school moving, truck regulation and Rogue river closing bills.

Malheur favored the oleo margarine tax which failed to pass in the state. Measures for tax supervision and control and educational appropriations failed to pass, while the state approved the measure limiting the ballot on certain issues to property owners.

The county voted as follows: For Repeal— Yes 1691 No 1477. Income Tax— Yes 1487 No 1112. Hydro-Electric— Yes 571 No 987.

VOTERS ELECT BLODGETT MAYOR

J. R. HUNTER WINS OFFICES OF RECORDER AND JUSTICE OF THE PEACE.

In the city election, Attorney E. M. Blodgett was elected mayor of Nyssa. He will serve with Eddie Powell, who polled the largest vote, Howard J. Larsen, Dr. E. D. Norcott and Ted Newell, councilmen-elect. A. H. Boydell was elected treasurer without opposition.

J. R. Hunter took the lead in the race for the office of city recorder. He will succeed A. R. Millar, recorder for many years. Mr. Blodgett will succeed Mayor Dick Tensen, incumbent. Mr. Hunter was elected justice of the peace succeeding W. B. Hoxie.

Vale re-elected J. W. Kiser mayor in a close race with C. C. Coats. Councilmen elected were Art Hunt, P. R. Shurtliff, R. H. Nichol, H. R. Humphrey and Lou Blaydon. Percy Purvis is recorder and justice of the peace.

George K. Aiken was re-elected mayor of Ontario.

PIERCE RIDES TO VICTORY WITH MANY DEMOCRATS

BOURBONS DEFEAT REPUBLICAN CANDIDATES FOR FIVE COUNTY OFFICES; GLENN STAYS IN.

Swept into the presidency of the United States with an overwhelming majority all over the country, Franklin D. Roosevelt also carried Malheur county by several hundred votes and the towns of Nyssa and Ontario. Throughout the nation, Democratic candidates for congress were the winners with the result that both houses will be Bourbon.

Roosevelt carried 42 states, Hoover six, Pennsylvania, Vermont, Maine, New Hampshire, Delaware and Connecticut. Roosevelt leads in Oregon with 125,944 votes to 80,678 for Hoover with returns tabulated from 1212 precincts out of 783.

Senat. Frank Steiwer and James W. Mott, both for congress in the first district, among the few Republicans who carried the Democratic landslide of the nation. Walter M. Pierce is leaving Robt. R. Butler by over 3000 votes for congressman from this district.

Republican candidate, on the state ticket are believed safe, while the Democrats made a landslide in Idaho.

Democrats Win In County With the majority in favor of a "new deal," voters in Malheur county gave Democratic candidates a substantial preference, with the exception of Sheriff C. W. Glenn whom they re-elected. Complete but unofficial returns, follow:
