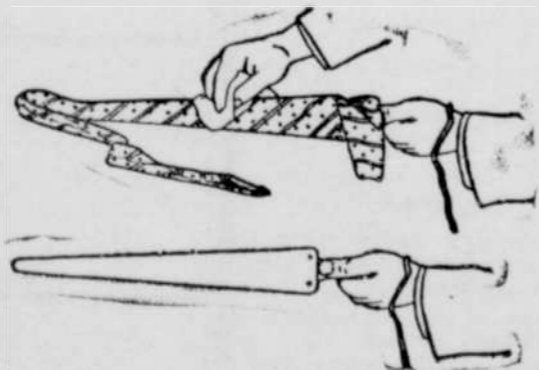

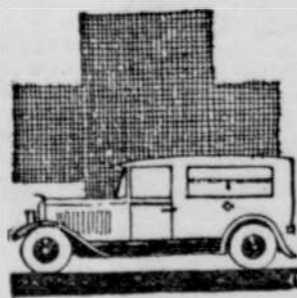
## PLAY MAKES MONEY FOR OWYHEE SCHOOL

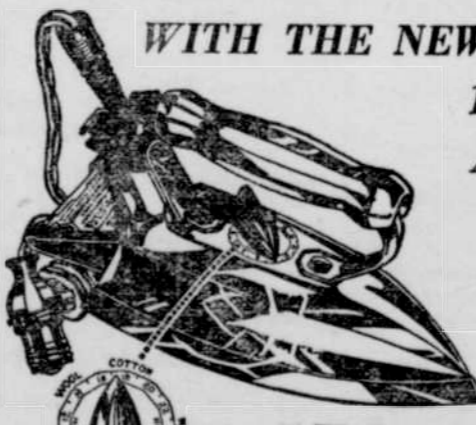
