Whereas, The National Reclamation Association bestowed upon him the high honor of being its first President which will demand much time and effort on his part.

JORDAN VALLEY'S REFINANCE PLAN WINS STATE O. K.

LAND OWNERS HAVE 50 YEARS IN WHICH TO LIQUIDATE PER ACRE LIEN OF \$66.31; COUNTY COURT COOPERATES.

Members of the Oregon reclamation commission have approved a contract entered into between the bondholders' committee and settlers on the Jordan Valley irrigation project in Malheur county, whereby the bonds of the project will be pooled and the land owners will have 50 years in which to pay off their obligations.

Bonds of the district aggregate \$430,000 which with interest of \$76,500 makes the total bond debt \$506,500. There are 8000 acres affected by the refinancing and the lien per acre has been fixed at \$63.31.

Officials said 85 per cent of the bonds already had been deposited with the commission and that more than 90 per cent of the land owners had signed the contract.

The Malheur county court has also agreed to sell all county lands within the district contingent upon the contract and lien, this step having been consummated last week when W. S. Bruce, C. E. Lanning and L. Y. Matthews appeared before the court in behalf of the reorganization plan.

In event of crop failures or other emergencies bondholders have delegated to the commission authority to reduce interest payments during the first 10 years of the contract. The bonds draw interest at 3 per cent. Settlers may pay off any part or all of their obligation at any time. In case of full payment, they are not subject to the lien.

CHRISTMAS TIME HAS ITS HAZARDS SAYS FIRE CHIEF

As the Christmas holidays draw near State Fire Marshal A. H. Averill, reminds us of precautions which should be taken to insure the fullest enjoyment of these festivities which so universally center about the home. Up to a few years ago, Christmas casualties resulting from unsafe decoration and celebration practices were all too numerous and fatal.

First of all, the Christmas tree should be placed several feet away from any heating or lighting fixtures and fastened securely so it cannot topple over. Lighted candles, even in this age of electricity, sometimes are used as ornaments in trees and in windows, but since this is a hazardous practice it never should be permitted. Many children and adults have been burned to death in fires originating in this way. Strings of miniature electric bulbs are far safer.

Ornaments that are either slow burning or inflammable are recommended for trees and room decorations instead of paper, cotton or other burnable materials.

Usually gifts as unwrapped close to the Christmas tree and the thin paper danger follows. Not only might the gift be dropped to the floor and allowed to house burn down but clothing may accumulate. Smoking nearby is dangerous. Ignite in the struggle to put out the fire, for if a match is lighted at this time there is great danger of fire. Matches, after being lighted, may not catch fire should be rolled in be entirely out when discarded and if a rug or woolen blanket to smother the flames.
