To obtain Highest Market Prices, Turkey Growers are urged to select only the well fleshed birds, remove all feathers and pin feathers, clean all dirt and blood from body, feet and head. Cool the dressed birds for 12 to 24 hours but be careful that the birds do not freeze.

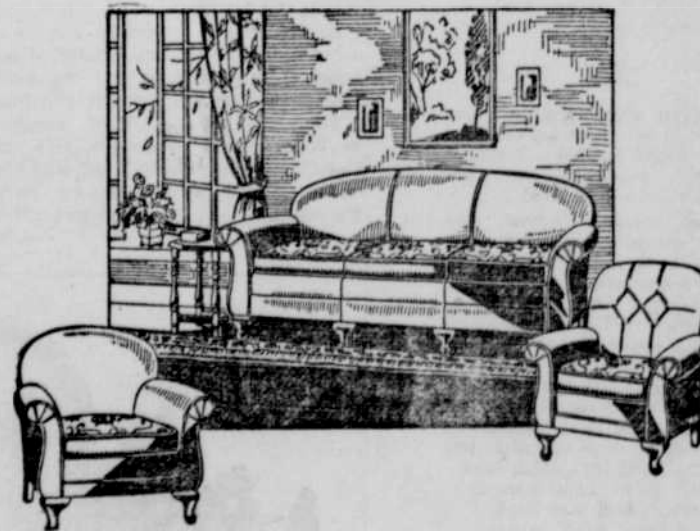
