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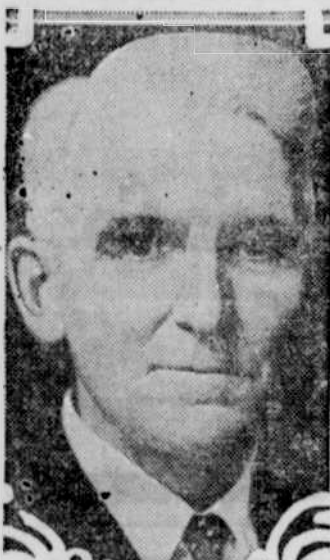

Why Build I-O-N Away From More Populous Area

Jordan Valley—(To the Editor)—Had the people of the county seat listened to the advice of the people of Jordan Valley, there need never have been the expense of building the Succor Creek road. Had the road been built over the old route then in use, Oregon could only have built to the state line over an easy grade and Idaho would have met the road there. We could have had an oiled road with a water grade, for what the other road cost.

The people here cannot be blamed because they make the Boise valley towns their trading center. It is only in the last five years that we could even get to our county seat without going away around through Idaho. Vale and Ontario and Nyssa all have oiled highways and railroads. We have only a dirt road that is almost impassable at times, and very rough at the best.

Why not all get together on this I-O-N route and boost. Then the road would be built as soon as funds are available.

You have built your Yellowstone road which was boosted long after the I-O-N. Now why not give this part of the country some support. We still pay taxes and vote, and are pretty good citizens at that.

Just out of curiosity we wonder if The Journal or The Argus would explain why some people go to so much extra effort every time someone comes along with some story about a new route for the I-O-N road?

And again, just what have the people of Rockville, Sheaville, Jordan Valley and the Jordan Valley project ever done to Vale and Ontario and people of that territory to make them use every available effort to deprive us of a decent road.

This stretch of road, for which we have tried so long, actually supplies six U. S. post offices directly on the road, from Rockville to Rome, and these offices serve a great number of people or they would never have been established by the post office department.

What is the object in running this road through an almost entirely uninhabited stretch of rough country, and cutting out all the producing part of the country?

Just now a large part of the federal allotment of funds is being squandered in a survey to Crane.

Would any one coming over this road from Nevada or California go away from Nevada or California when they wanted to get to any of the Boise valley towns?
