"At the Legislature"

A belligerent session of the board of control, with an open break between Governor Meier and State Treasurer Rufus Holman almost eclipsed interest in the legislature this week. In a special message, the governor proposed consolidation of the veterans' aid commission with the state land board.

Cohorts of the sales tax, recovered from defeat at the special session, have suggested a general sale tax at 3 per cent, with two thirds of the revenue for the counties as an offset to property levies for county and school purposes and one third for the state. A small home owner exemption of \$1500 is carried. The tax commission admits there is no precedent for such a tax.

New House Bills

H. B. 7 designates Valley Falls-Central Oregon highway junction and Burns-John Day road as state highways.

H. B. 8 provides bounties of \$20 on cougars, \$30 on wolves.

H. B. 9 increases income tax.

H. B. 11 designates time in which sheriff shall issue deed on foreclosure sale.

H. B. 12 relate to interest and penalty on delinquent taxes.

H. B. 22 repeals sections relating to state tax levy for market roads.

H. B. 24 would shift to state the purchase of highway right of way.

H. B. 35 to tax tobacco, malts and cosmetics in lieu of state tax on property.

H. B. 37 to amend code to make it so sellers of real property who take back a purchase price mortgage as part of consideration cannot obtain levy on other property.

H. B. 38 providing manner for recall.

H. B. 53 providing for transfer to county of real property owned by individuals.

H. B. 64 to amend section relating to judiciary ballot.

Senate Bills

S. B. 2 provides for reduction of state

salaries.

S. B. 23 amends code relating to foreclosures and prohibits deficiency judgments.

S. B. 24 provides county manager form of government.

S. B. 26 exempts parsonages from taxation.

S. B. 27 authorizes school districts to issue warrants in amount equalled by pending tax receipts.

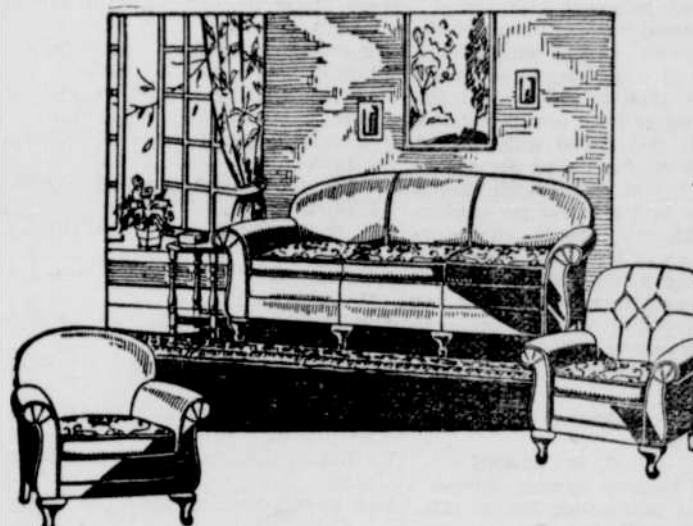

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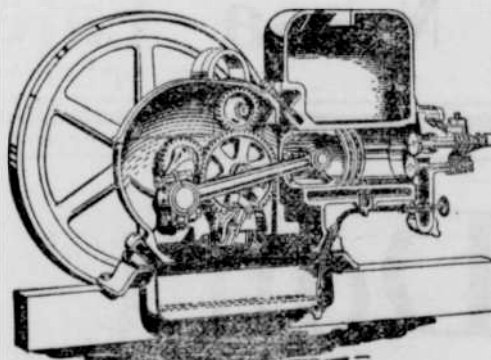
