

PRESIDENT-ELECT FAVORS PROJECTS, HE TELLS DANA

**ROOSEVELT WOULD FIND HAVEN
FOR UNEMPLOYED ON RECLAIM-
ED LANDS ON WEST, LOAN BILL
INTRODUCED.**

Through the efforts of Marshall N. Dana of Portland, president of the national reclamation association, Senator John Thomas of Idaho, chairman of the senate committee on irrigation, Friday introduced a bill to authorize a loan of \$5,000,000 to the reclamation fund. Repayment would begin in 1941. The purpose is to insure funds for construction work on existing projects.

Mr. Dana advised the Owyhee board of directors that he had made a trip to New York City, while in the east, for the purpose of discussing reclamation with President-elect Roosevelt. He found Mr. Roosevelt in sympathy with such developments in the west as the Vale and Owyhee projects. He stated that Mr. Roosevelt made the declaration that he would like to place 6,000,000 people on reclaimed lands for whom employment will not be available even after normal agencies have gotten fully under headway.

"As to the Owyhee," said Mr. Dana, "we took it up specifically with Dr. Mead, Senator Steiwer, Congressman Smith of Idaho and General Martin of Oregon. Dr. Mead is doing everything in his power to have the item for the Owyhee restated as \$1,900,000. Senator McNary said he felt very confident he could have the Owyhee item included in the deficiency bill if it became apparent that the reclamation fund would be unequal to the draft upon it."

An effort is also being made to have the Vale project item restated to a sum sufficient to insure the building of the North Fork reservoir.

GOVERNOR ROSS HAS SIGNED REPEAL OF GIN MARRIAGE LAW

Governor Ross of Idaho yesterday signed the death knell to the "gin marriage law," repealing the statute which required five days' notice of intention to wed in the neighboring state. The repeal action becomes effective in 60 days—about March 25. After passage of the law in 1931, Idaho couples came to Vale, Malheur county seat, after their licenses and hundreds of couples were married in the towns of Vale, Ontario and Nyssa. Idaho pastors, county officers and justices of the peace joined in opposition to the law during the last few months and shortly after the opening of the Idaho legislature, they sought its repeal.

Its repeal may make some inroads on marriage business in Malheur, but County Clerk Roy Daley says Cupid brought at least 50 per cent of his marriages from across the border before the Idaho gin marriage law was passed.

INSURANCE RATE AGAIN SLASHED

**OREGON RATING BUREAU RE-
TURNS OLD RATING TO NYSSA
PROPERTY, TRUCK QUESTION
STILL UP.**

In view of the showing made by Don M. Graham, insurance agent and assistant fire chief of the city, the Oregon rating bureau has returned Nyssa residential property to Grade B rating, which in effect saves property owners hundreds of dollars in the annual cost of insurance protection. Last fall the rating was advanced to Grade 9, which resulted in a 50 per cent increase in the annual charge.

Mr. Graham and Attorney E. M. Blodgett received notice of the change in rating Saturday. No recommendation as to motor fire truck was made but it is reported that the city will again discuss the purchase of such a truck at the regular meeting scheduled for February 6.

The city fire department was reorganized recently and regular drill practice is planned by Sid Bubridge, chief for the added protection of city property.

Biological Survey Doubts If Coyotes Mate With Dogs; Newt Gets Eulogy

Was the unusual coyote brought into Nyssa some weeks ago of coyote and ordinary dog parentage? Stanley Young, of the U. S. bureau of biological survey, thinks not. In a letter to Robert Long he says the unusual specimen should be referred to "canis latrans testis."

"While it is a very peculiar individual, small apparently in body as well as skull and with a rather malformed skull, it would appear that the variation is due to some injury or disease the animal went through during its younger days or possibly to some form of malnutrition," stated Mr. Young. On account of the interesting variation the specimen is being retained for the survey collection.

Some doubt has also been expressed as to whether the unusual Chinese pheasant at The Journal office is a hybrid, in spite of the fact that his head resembles that of the Wyandotte chicken very closely and carries almost as many white feathers on his body as the gray painted feathers of the average pheasant rooster. The pheasant was mounted by R. Parkinson and stands

as straight and proud as he did in life and never fails to impress the lover of wild game.

In a eulogy to the "biologists of Nyssa," The Oregonian called the newt, which is still swimming in the jar at the Nyssa Realty office, the "monster of Cottonwood creek." "Our old friend the salamander has been getting himself mistaken for a reptile when he is a cousin to the bull-frog. A duller more amiable, less harmful creature never drowned in the edges of Cottonwood creek."

"There are legends in southern Oregon," continued The Oregonian, "of a giant black salamander that lives in the trout sections of that region. It is said to measure 18 to 20 inches in length. But great or little, the salamanders are without harm and if the biologists of Nyssa will go to Cottonwood creek on a warm fall day when the water is low, they can scarcely fail of apprehending not a few near relatives of that self-same 'swimming lizard.'"

It seems, however, that very few people have observed the newt in this locality.

CITY AND COUNTY TAX LEVIES LESS, ROAD TAX IS CUT

**LEVIES FOR NYSSA, VALE AND
ONTARIO SHOW VARYING RE-
DUCTIONS, STATE LEVY DOUB-
LED.**

When Malheur county property owners receive their tax statements this spring they will find the millage for general levies about the same as for the year previous but they will find city levies somewhat less and a few changes in the levies for the respective school districts. The levy for high school also shows a decrease from 6.53 to 5.2 mills. General roads decreased from 2.1 mills to 5 mills, effecting an estimated saving of \$15,000.

A statement sent The Journal Tuesday by Murray Morton, assessor shows that an increase is made in state tax to 5.56 for 1933 as compared with 2.3 a year ago. This may be eliminated in part if the proposed sales tax or some substitute for the state tax on property is enacted by the legislature. The increase in state tax offset some economies which were made in county, library and road levies.

TERTELING PAYS DAMAGE ON CAR

After awarding \$450 damages to E. G. Nolan Seattle salesman, for damages to his car hit by a truck owned by J. A. Terteling company of Ellensburg, Wash., the jury was dismissed last Wednesday evening by Judge W. W. Wood. The accident occurred in Malheur county near Huntington when the Terteling company was engaged in road construction. COUNTY ROADS ARE IMPROVED, NEEDED GET RELIEF WORK

**NYSSA CREW COMPLETES MILE
OF GRAVELING FROM RAY TO
KOOPMAN RANCH, CEMETERY
ROAD IS NEXT.**

The Nyssa section will have at least \$2000 worth of road improvements at a cost of half that amount by the time the county court's relief project is completed in this district, so far does a dollar spread its wings with labor at \$1.50 per day and gravel at 3 cents per yard instead of the ten usually paid. Archie Howell has crews of from 12 to 24 men at work each day but it will be necessary to rotate them as applicants for the relief work have increased to around one hundred here.

Howell's crew completed a mile of graveling from the John Ray to the Fred Koopman ranch Tuesday and started the run from Koopman's to the Nyssa cemetery. In rainy seasons, the road is almost impassable so the improvement will be welcomed. Graveling will continue until the \$1000 Nyssa appropriation is exhausted. Gravel is being hauled from the Pieter Tensen pit.

Similar relief work is underway at Ontario and Vale, the court having appropriated \$3000 from the general road fund.

State Job Under Way
The General Construction company has work under way on the state relief project, the Drinkwater pass section of the Central Oregon highway near Juniper. State and federal funds are paying for the work in order to give relief employment to around 150 men from Multnomah, Harney and Malheur counties. The men receive 50c cents an day and work 5-hour shift, five days a week. After board is paid, their net wage is about \$5.50 a week.

FORMER NYSSA MAN SUCCUMBS IN BOISE

Iver L. Nelson, 87, resident of Nyssa many years ago, died at his home in Boise late Tuesday night following a short illness. He was born May 24, 1845, in Denmark. Surviving are his wife, two daughters Mrs. Katie L. Whitson, Miss Anna Nelson and one son Thos. N. Nelson, all of Boise. Funeral services were held today at the Elks' temple in Boise and interment was in Morris Hill cemetery.

NEW CANAL CUTS THRU WHITE EARTH

At one place the canal is 35 feet deep with an embankment of 125 feet on a hillside of white earth. Mr. Kakebeke says it is a sight worth going many miles to see.

He is now reported somewhat improved. The boy is a nephew of C. E. Winters of Adrian.

TERTELING GETS ROAD CONTRACT

**STATE MAY SUSPEND SECONDARY
HIGHWAY WORK IN MALHEUR
COUNTY.**

At yesterday's meeting of the state highway commission, J. A. Terteling company submitted the low bid for .89 mile of grading on the Drinkwater Pass section of the Central Oregon highway at \$26,358. The work was made possible by reason of the less than estimated cost of the section now being built by the General Construction company in the same vicinity.

Terteling company is building the first link of Owyhee irrigation canal south of Nyssa.

Of interest to this county was the report of the road commission yesterday that secondary highway work may be suspended until May 1, on account of the uncertainty of highway finances. Definite decision will not be made until Engineer R. H. Baldock has made a further study of the effect of such an order. The order would effect the Nyssa-Jordan Valley market road and others in Malheur county.

January Lambing Begins at Many Sheep Camps in Malheur County

"Ba-a-a, ba-a-a!" say the many doubles and few singles that are arriving at the January lambing camps of sheepmen in this vicinity. Asked if the weather is favorable and if the season is successful, Mr. Wool Grower said yesterday, "Yes, twins are numerous and the weather is cold and dry if not as warm as it might be."

To see that the new babies are properly taken care of, Fulton Fleetwood, state humane officer, visited many lambing camps in this section yesterday and today. He found most of them well heated and with clean, well built cribs for the maternity wards. He explained that the mothers and their babies remain in the cribs from three to four days, depending upon the weather.

"The lambing camp is a maternity ward in a big way," said Mr. Fleetwood, "for hundreds of lambs are born each day. When a ewe dies, her baby is adopted out if possible. Sometimes it is no trick to find a mother. Frequently, the hide of the dead lamb is placed over the orphan to fool the wise ewe. Sometimes she is tied until she accepts the orphan. Sheepmen even resort to threatening ewe and lamb with a
