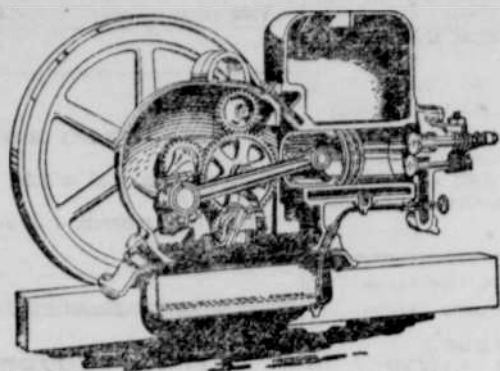


LITTLE NEWS OF NYSSA
