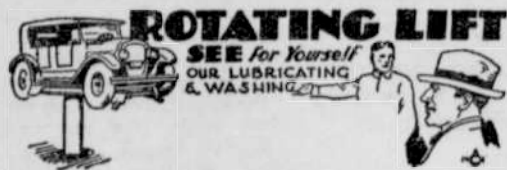

the way. The House passed the farm "allotment" or "parity" bill, by a vote of 203 to 151. The bill will have to run another gauntlet in the Senate. The terms may be changed, but it is going through, sooner or later.

The law will in effect give a bounty to the producers of certain staple products who agree to reduce production. The seven products included in the House bill are wheat, cotton, tobacco, hogs, dairy products and rice and peanuts. Efforts to load the bill up with other products were voted down. It is felt that if real pressure is put behind a few key products these will carry other farm products along with them.

The actual operation of the measure is still hazy. The effect however will be to lift the price of wheat and rice at once to 75 cents a bushel, cotton to nine cents a pound, hogs to five cents, butter fat to 26 cents and peanuts to three cents. Later, by a sliding scale, the prices would be raised to the pre-war average level.

The law will be administered by the Secretary of Agriculture, and it will be in force for just one crop year, but can then be extended by the president if found satisfactory. The bounties will be paid by the Treasury, in the form of certificates equivalent to money. The money is to be provided by special taxes levied on the first "processing" of the article benefited. The rates will be adjusted from time to time, based on prevailing prices and other factors.

For instance the "processing" tax for wheat would be levied on the millers. The amount raised would be distributed to the farmers who join in the plan, on the basis of their production. They would be paid the difference between the prevailing price and the "parity" price. The packers would have to pay the tax on hogs, while the cotton fund would be raised by a special tax on rayon and silk and a duty on imported cotton. Special rules will be made for dealing with tobacco and dairy products.

As might be imagined, there is tremendous opposition to the relief plan. Wall Street is plain mad. It is reported to be greatly "disappointed" over the developments at Washington. This is certainly too bad! The packers and millers are also up in arms. All of a sudden, they are deeply concerned about the prices the "consumers" may have to pay.

Practically half the country—namely the farmers and the communities which depend on the farming industry—is below the general level in buying power. Business cannot be resumed until these people are able to buy again.

Public money has been poured out like water to aid the banks, railroads and other big business interests. In short this has become so common that it arouses great surprise when it is suggested that our basic industry farming should receive a helping hand.

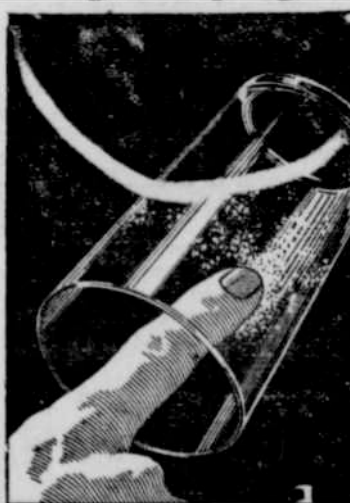
