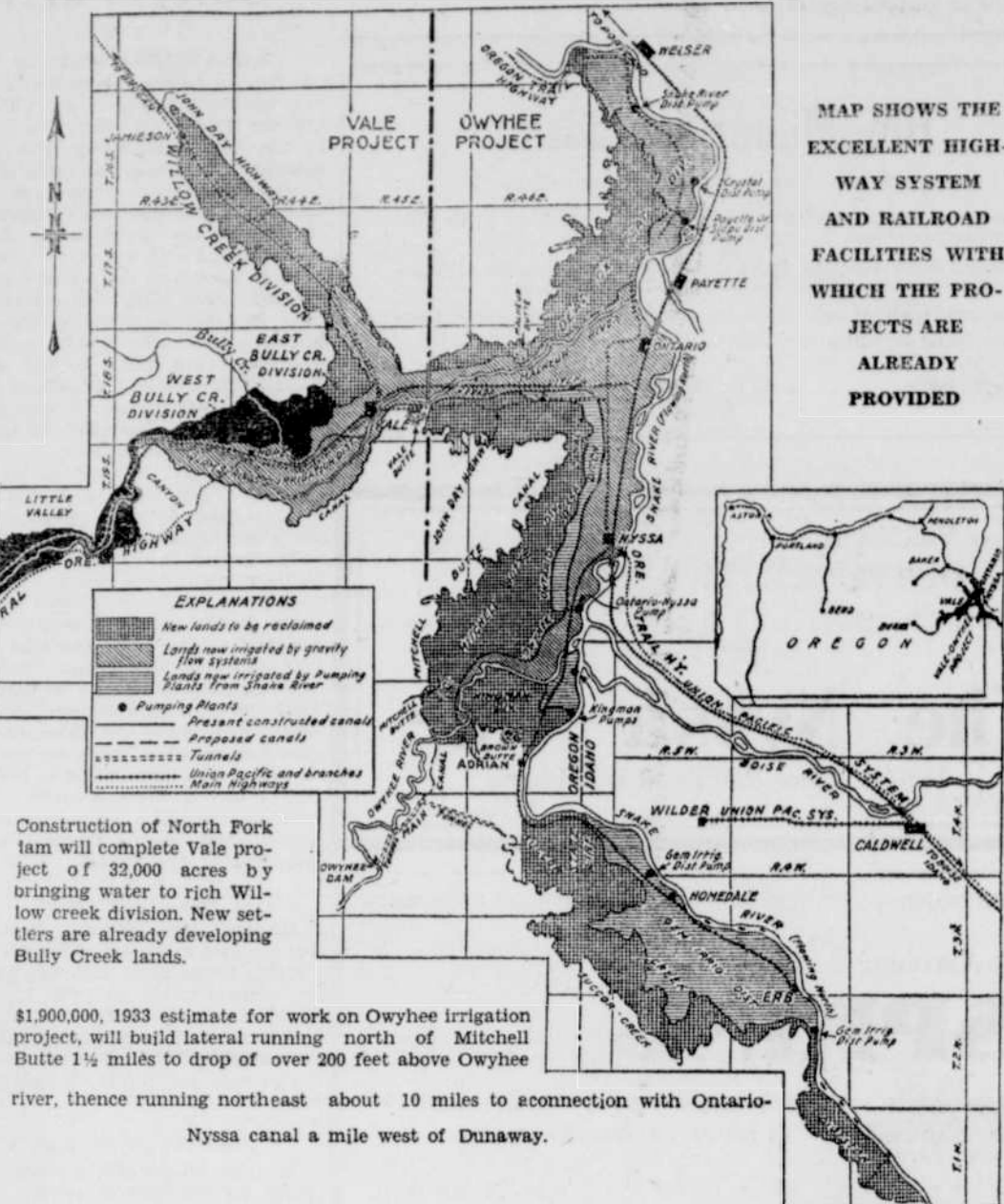
## 1933 Appropriations for Vale and Owyhee Irrigation Projects Will Accomplish Much

## AROCK GRANGER IS AGAINST SALES TAX

Arock—(To the Journal)—Are we going to have a sales tax in Oregon?

It is apparent that the interests which would materially benefit by the enactment of a sales tax are the very large property owners, who are attempting to saddle the expenses of government onto the poor. Do they not see that such a tax would result in a tremendous loss to Oregon business through trade across its borders and through mail order trade?

If we of small income stop to think, we will see that we represent the buying power of the United States. It stands us in hand to take an active part in this tax matter which vitally concerns us at a time when our "50-cent dollar" must be stretched as far as possible. Nothing can be gained by silence. We should tell our legislators what we want.

The average individual has pared his budget to meet his income. So, must the government. There are many instances in which material savings can be made. It is hinted that the grange does not agree on the sales tax. This is not true. We are united on this question and will see it through to the end. The public

eye is fastened on the grange and we intend to merit that confidence. Our state legislative committee bases its stand against the sales tax on sound judgment. Subordinate granges have studied the question and they know why Mississippi has a sales tax and what it is doing to that state.

The sales tax is a bait in that it is proposed to cancel the around 3 mills state tax on property if the sales tax passes. We must not overlook the fact that the 3-mill property tax costs the large property owner far more than the sales tax would as the sales tax hits the small consumer. The 3-mill property tax would cost \$3 per \$1000 valuation; the 2 per cent sales tax costs \$20 per \$1000 spent for the necessities of life. It can be seen that the state tax on property is the lesser of the two evils.
