

MCCOY URGES FIGHT FOR VETS

IF NATIONAL RELIEF FOR DISABLED VETS IS RULED OUT, BURDEN WILL FALL ON LOCAL TAXPAYERS, SAYS COMMANDER.

This is a fighting year for fighting men, believes C. L. McCoy, commander of Nyssa Post No. 79 of the American Legion.

"Never before in the history of the Legion has the veteran's cause been under such heavy fire from powerful interests as at the present time," he said. "Veterans who have worked many years to gain the just benefits they are now receiving are in danger of losing their benefits—and all because the veteran himself is not fully aware of what is taking place."

"It has taken nearly fifteen years for the men who were made millionaires

during the war and the prosperity following the war, to realize that someone must pay for the folly of war, and the most logical ones to pay are those who amassed fortunes during the times of war. They laid out the treasure of the country, and that the handicaps he suffered from his war service should now be discontinued for reasons of economy."

"But who will care for the war disabled?" asks Mr. McCoy. "Well, if the national government don't provide for them, then the local communities will have to provide for them, and the tax burden will then be a local question that will have to be met by each county or state."

"All veterans of the world war should belong to the Legion, and find out what this economy move is all about and how it will affect them. The American Legion is fighting their cause for them, and during the coming month is putting on a strenuous membership campaign that is nation-wide, to enroll one million veterans into the Legion, to give its national officers real talking strength to carry on the cause of the veteran."

Penalty For Hoarding

Nyssa.—(To the Journal)—There is no doubt in the minds of the majority of the people and a great many broad minded ex-bankers that something is wrong with our banking and money systems. Some people see one fault, some another, but all seem to agree that both systems are not perfect.

Many outside complex conditions have a great influence on banking and the money system. Of the most evil influence is the fluctuation of commodity prices, demonstrated the past three years through the many bank business and farm failures. If this condition is taken care of the banks will have a better chance.

The banks as you know are maintained largely through the credit they can loan and successfully collect with good interest. But you would agree there would be little chance of loaning money for interest if all producers were receiving value for what they produced. Therefore the banking institutions would have to look to another system of obtaining revenue to maintain the banks. Others will be explained later.

Let's take up the money system. Our present money is liquid. It is easily passed from one to another and there lies one fault. Property, as a rule, is not passed from one to another, as money is without at least one or more signatures to signify that a transaction is made. The fact that money is so liquid also encourages crime, bank robberies, holdups, kidnapping and ransom demands. That alone should be enough to make the people clamor for a better money system.

Another fault is the ease with which it can be hoarded and kept from circulation. A money system could be adopted that would penalize hoarding. Suppose the government placed a penalty of 1 per cent per month on deposits held from circulation. That would do away with hoarding and at the same time create revenue to help maintain the money system.

Of course our present money would be eliminated entirely and a system nearly like our present checking system could be adopted. In that case there would be no actual money in the bank, but instead they would be just book-keeping establishments of the government maintained by a stamp affixed to each check issued. Some of the faults of our present system have been outlined. How can they be remedied if a new system is not adopted?—A. D. Moses, Nyssa, Oregon.

EVERYDAY HELPS

It is nearly time to take down the curtains and draperies. One woman washes her curtains and then slips them on a rod to dry. They dry evenly and are much easier to iron or fold for packing purposes. And with curtains washed, we must remember the windows. An easy method of washing windows and one method that brings results is to add two tablespoons of kerosene to two quarts of warm water. Wash the glass with a soft cloth and polish immediately after.

PARTY RECIPES

Jello Hearts—1 tablespoon granulated gelatin, ¼ cup cold water, ¼ cup boiling water, ¼ cup sugar, pinch of salt, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1 cup canned pineapple juice, red fruit coloring, canned pineapple slices, lettuce, dressing. Soften the gelatin in the cold water, add the boiling water, the sugar and salt and stir until thoroughly dissolved. Combine with the fruit juice and color bright red. Turn into a shallow pan dipped into cold water, chill and cut out with a heart-shaped cutter. Arrange on slices of canned pineapple, garnish with lettuce and serve with whipped cream or other dressing.

Marshmallow Pineapple Mold—1 package lime flavored gelatin, 1 pint warm water, 3 slices canned pineapple, diced; 10 marshmallows finely cut. Dissolve gelatin in warm water. Chill. When slightly thickened, fold in pineapple and marshmallows. Turn into mold. Chill until firm. Unmold and serve with marshmallow sauce, if desired. This serves 6. To make marshmallow sauce take ½ pound marshmallows (30 equal ¼ pound), 2 cups confectioner's sugar, 3-4 cup boiling water. Cut marshmallows and place in top of double boiler. Add water and sugar and stir until smooth. Cook five minutes.

MORTGAGE ADJUSTMENT IS AIM

A movement to prevent the wholesale foreclosure of farm mortgages in those cases where the farmer really intends to pay, took definite shape last week with the organization of a voluntary statewide adjustment committee. As we understand it, the committee plans to act as a sort of an arbitrator, a go-between, to aid in working out some means of settlement between borrower and lender whereby a home might be saved for a deserving but unfortunate borrower.

The movement is fathered by Paul V. Maris, director of extension at Oregon State college. Working with him is Ray W. Gill, master of the Oregon grange and such leaders as Robert W. Sawyer, Bend, president of the Oregon Reclamation congress, Fred Phillips, of the Oregon Wool Growers and P. L. Ballard county agent leader. O. M. Plummer, manager of the Pacific Live-stock Exposition, is chairman and L. R. Breithaupt, economist at the college, is secretary. It will be remembered that Mr. Breithaupt was Malheur county agent some years ago.

Through county and local committees to be set up by the state organization it is hoped to provide a means of affording fair and impartial information and assistance to both borrowers and lenders in farm mortgages on a purely voluntary basis, as the committee will have no legal standing. Such assistance, however, will afford means of making suitable adjustments in principal and interest.

Similar state movements are being worked out successfully in the middle-west notably in Iowa and Ohio where farm organizations financial agencies and the college extension service are cooperating in meeting this serious problem that has arisen from the drop of farm prices and land values.

Statistics presented at the first Salem meeting by L. R. Breithaupt, agricultural economist of the extension service show that approximately 28,000 or 52 per cent of Oregon farms are mortgaged. Estimates are that 40 per cent or more of these mortgages are now delinquent. When many of the debts were contracted, often for what appeared to be conservative expansion or improvements, the average cash income per farm in Oregon was around \$2200 a year but in 1932 estimates were an average of \$950 per year.

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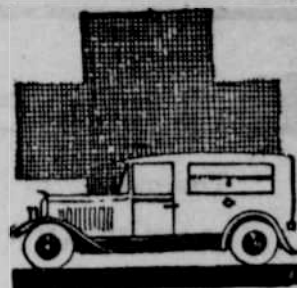
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
