LA GRANDE GOES TO SALEM

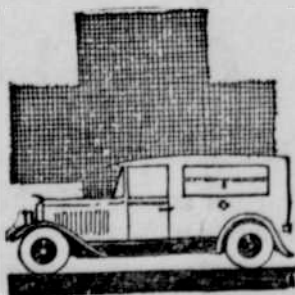

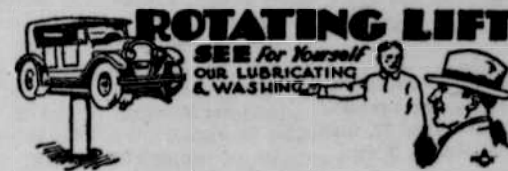
