

WOOL GROWERS RECEIVE CHECKS

FLOCKMASTERS GET ADVANCE OF
MARKET INCREASES FOLLOW-
ING DELIVERIES.

Final settlement checks on a million and a quarter pound pool of 1932 wool, consisting of farm flocks and graded range clips, are this week being received by Eastern Oregon members of the Pacific Cooperative Wool Growers who had wool in this accumulation.

These wool checks represent balances due members in this territory and are particularly welcome at this time of the year when growers need money badly. The members received advance payments at the time the wool was delivered, representing approximately 75 per cent of the value of the clips at that time. Since then the market has worked up so that in many cases the final settlement checks equal the amount of the original advance, according to R. A. Ward, general manager of the Association. "This is an example of the advantages of growers through orderly marketing and cooperative selling," says Mr. Ward, general manager of the Association. "When the market advances during the selling season the growers themselves, instead of dealers, receive the benefit of that upturn."

This is the second large pool of 1932 wool to be settled by the Pacific, and 85 per cent of the growers in the Northwest who are members of this coopera-

tive have now received their final returns for their 1932 wool. The Association has been operating in the northwest for twelve years, and this year handled a total of six and a quarter million pounds of wool.

The better combing and clothing wools in the pool netted the growers from 9c to 11c a pound at their shipping station, and these wools made up all except a very small percentage of the total weight of the pool.

The Pacific Cooperative, after two years in the National corporation, in 1932 returned to the independent method of operation which it followed from 1921 to 1930. The 1932 wool was sold through its own sales organization on an orderly marketing plan, permitting the Association to make final settlements comparatively early in the year.

The Association is planning to handle a large volume of wool in 1933 and is looking forward to a good year. It appears, say corporation officials, that the long decline in wool prices which commenced in 1924 is definitely over and it is reasonable to expect gradually rising markets during 1933 and the years immediately following.—Adv.

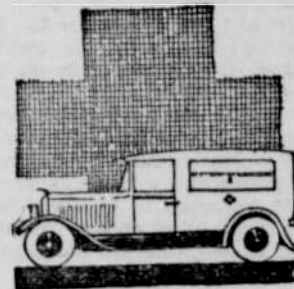

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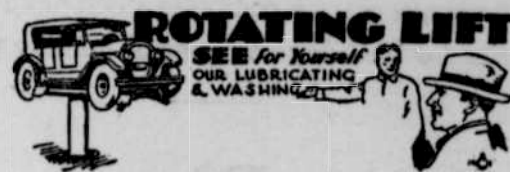
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
