Girls Lead 4-H Boys Four to 1 In 1933 Project

COUNTY 4-H NEWS

Thirty-eight 4-H clubs with an enrollment of 289 boys and girls are working on 1933 projects in Malheur county, according to Russell M. McKennon, assistant county agent and club leader. Of the total enrolled, 220 are girls. McKennon reports several boys' clubs in the process of organization which may increase the boys' enrollment but he believes the girls will have the best of it so far as enrollment is concerned. The clubs are divided as follows:

Sewing—20 clubs with 156 members.
Cooking—10 clubs with 67 members.
Forestry—1 club with 10 members.
Calf—2 clubs with 14 members.
Poultry—1 club with 8 members.
Gardening—1 club with 9 members.
Handicraft—1 club with 9 members.
Corn—2 clubs with 16 members.

Club members will be interested to know that in the event the Malheur county fair is not held this fall, the Ontario Commercial club will sponsor a 4-H club and Smith-Hughes fair in order that all club projects may be exhibited.

KINGMAN KOLONY

Of interest is the formation of the first forestry club in Malheur county 4-H history. Eight boys have enrolled in Kingman Kolony with Maurice L. Judd, Nyssa rancher, the leader. The work consists of identification of trees, planting ten or more, collection of cones containing seed, at least one overnight trip to the forest and the preparation of an exhibit.
