HOW BACK TO DEMOCRACY?

VETERANS GET PAY SLASH ON JULY 1

Malheur county veterans and federal employees will be effected by the Roosevelt economy bill.

July 1, the veterans will take a flat cut of 20 per cent. New rates for disability range from \$8 to \$80 per month, reduced from \$10 to \$100.

The government will effect the greatest saving by slashes in non-service disability payments. Payment after July 1, will be limited to only those totally disabled, who will receive \$20 a month. Thus a veteran now receiving a monthly stipend for arrested tuberculosis, or any other ailment, which was not contracted in service or started by service would be removed.

All payments for temporary disabilities of non-service character and free hospitalization for such disabilities will be eliminated. The bill also provides that veterans with an income of \$2500 if married, or \$1500 if single, shall not receive benefits. Thus, the country will not have the spectacle of persons with remunerative fulltime jobs drawing money from the government for disability.

A flat decrease of 15 per cent in the federal payroll was announced in March.

COLLEGE MUSICIAN WILL ACT AS JUDGE

F. F. Beale, professor of music at the College of Idaho, will act as judge in the piano section of the Malheur county music contest in Ontario, Chas. A. Waddingham, director, informed The Journal Monday. "By securing an out of the county judge every contestant is assured a fair deal," said Mr. Waddingham. "In addition Prof. Beale will be a judge of unusual ability."

Mr. Waddingham stated that he was glad to see considerable interest in the contest in the Nyssa community this spring. Several contestants have planned to enter.

THE WEEK AT WASHINGTON

The Administration rocks along on its recovery program. The farm relief bill is pushed through the House with a vote of 315-98. The Senate gets it and slaps on the brakes with many proposed amendments. The President signs the beer law, making beer and wine legal April 7. Twenty labor leaders are invited for a March 31 discussion of hours, wages, public works, working agreements. President Roosevelt explains to congressional leaders that his reforestation bill does not mean "forced labor and military service," as charged by the American Federation of Labor. Workers can leave the camp

for better jobs. The \$1 a day pay plus board equals the regular \$2 unskilled labor rate. If the labor lobby fights the bill, the President will fight back plenty.
