"Most boys like animals. This fondness is increased when they own their own. Any enterprising boy can manage to own a pig, heifer or lamb. Choice ones are available very cheap. In six or eight years, through 4-H club work, such a boy will grow out a herd or flock of considerable size and value. It will happen so gradually yet so

quickly that he will marvel at it all. He will have gained a vast knowledge of worthwhile things that only experience can teach.

"Jobs for boys are scarce. They must work at home or be idle. 4-H work can fill an important place in the lives of boys and girls.

"Club members should plan to grow the feed for their livestock instead of buying it. A crop and livestock project rounds out their program. Pigs and corn, sheep or cattle and forage are good combinations."

There are a good many boys in Malheur county already doing the things desirable above. Now is a good time

for many more to do the same.

LADAK AND WHEAT GRASS GREATEST FORAGE PLANTS

"The forage finds of the century," is the term used to describe Ladak alfalfa and Crested Wheat grass by E. R. Jackman, extension specialist. These crops have now been tried out for enough years in Oregon to establish their unusual value.

"One can safely use superlatives in describing both of these crops," says Jackman. "Ladak is the longest lived, the most drought resistant, the most resistant, the leafiest, the hardest and the highest yielding alfalfa for all the high elevation short water regions of the United States. It is also highly resistant to bacterial wilt which has completely demoralized alfalfa growing in many sections.

"Again superlatively, Crested Wheat grass is the most drought resistant, the most frost resistant, the hardest, earliest starting, latest staying and best all around dry land grass for the same general region. Old time stockmen speak almost in reverence of the old bunch grass of the Oregon ranges. Crested Wheat grass in many respects is superior to the native bunch grass."

Crested Wheat not only equals the old bunch grass in every way, but exceeds it in that it recovers itself freely, says Jackman. Even seedlings attacked by drought can go dormant and return to a growing condition when rains come. In tests in every Eastern Oregon county it has already proved its worth.

ARCADIA WINS AGAIN

The undefeated Arcadia nine took another rural school victory Tuesday by trouncing Valley View 11 to 2. The preceding week Arcadia had defeated White Settlement 9 to 3. Lincoln downed White Settlement 10 to 4. Rural schools are playing for the championship. The 1932 pennant went to Arcadia and to date Arcadia is the leading contender for 1933.
