Orders for chilled horse meat have been piling up again, report Schlessers Brothers of Portland and as a result shipments from the ranges of Idaho, eastern Oregon and Canada are being resumed.

This packing firm had developed a widespread market in Holland, Sweden and Norway before difference in exchange rates placed a handicap on them which they could not surmount. With the dollar now depreciated on foreign exchanges they can again meet competition and the orders have resulted.

An increase also is recorded in the demand for food made of sheep, beef and horse meat and marketed under the trade name of "Mankind Food."

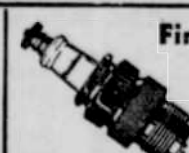
