## IN THE FOREST

Twenty-four Malheur county boys, six from Nyssa, form a part of the Roosevelt army which will spend the summer doing useful work in the forests. This conservation work is a program of man building as well as forest building, the President says.

He plans to make the enterprise a part of our national policy, and it is expected to pay dividends to the present

and future generations. It will bring improvements in public domains which have been overlooked in the whirl of industrial development. More important, however, than the material gains will be the moral and spiritual value of such work.

Mr. Roosevelt is right when he says the overwhelming majority of unemployed Americans, who are walking the streets and receiving private or public relief, would infinitely prefer to work.

The forest program will give the younger men work and eliminate to some extent the threat that enforced idleness brings to spiritual and moral stability. The boys will be working, working in the out-of-doors and in healthful surroundings.

In all plans for the forest conservation work, man-rehabilitation and forest conservation have been given equal weight. The boys will not be coddled. They will contribute to the betterment and security of the forests and at the same time contribute toward their own self respect.

A better summer looms ahead for boys from everywhere.
