

1933 Was Banner Year In Athletics For Grads and Gang of Nyssa High

Vacation brought an end to Nyssa high school's most successful season in athletics, according to Coach John Young.

Baseball, closing sport of the year, was outstanding for the reason that Nyssa high won the championship of eastern Oregon and Snake river valley leagues. Dean Johnston, pitcher, was

awarded the baseball trophy given by Coach Young. Four graduates, Max Schweizer, Johnston, Kenneth Williams and Orville McEwen, were on the team. Others were Earl and Bela Sager, Meredith Seits, Ross Johnston, Oswald Forbes, Arthur Vernon Cook, Harold Anderson and Calvin Wilson.

Nyssa high won the football title in Malheur county and finished second to the large Emmett school in the Snake river schedule. Kenneth Williams, fighting little halfback, won the football trophy given at the close of the school year. Lettermen were Dean and Dwight Johnston, Schweizer, Williams, McEwen, Bob Walters, Paul Hatch, Lawrence Fisher, Clifford Lathen and Frank Lawrence.

In basketball Nyssa annexed the county title and finished in fourth place at the eastern Oregon tournament in Union. Schweizer won the basketball cup and also the trophy for all around athlete. He was captain and high scorer on the squad. Of the team, Hatch, Schweizer and Williams were graduates.

Howard Boor brought Nyssa added

laurels by taking the blue ribbon in the shot put in every track meet entered. Boren, Montgomery, Arnold Slippy and Calvin Wilson made letters in track.

Although Father Time reaped a rich reward by taking from three to eight boys from each squad through graduation, Coach Young says he is not without excellent prospects for 1933-34. "Each passing year brings the loss of boys who have fought, lost and won for the orange and black," he said, "but it also brings—the Freshmen."

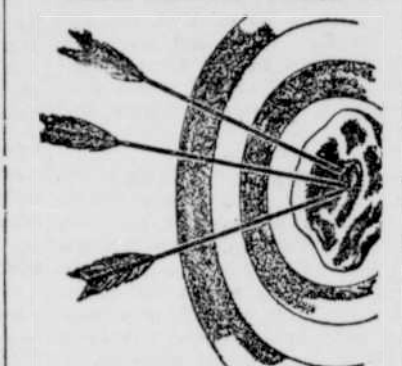
