

Oregon Is Divided Into Six Districts For Possible Farm Acreage Control

A suggested division of Oregon into six districts for the purpose of administering the federal farm act, and recommendation as to possible substitute crops for this state in case acreage reduction of surplus commodities is decided upon, have been submitted to Washington authorities at their request by Paul V. Maris, director of extension at O. S. C.

Malheur county is included in the Blue Mountain, or eastern Oregon division, comprising Umatilla, Union, Wal-

lawa, Baker and Malheur counties. Harney is in the central Oregon division which spreads to Wheeler county. Other divisions, all based upon climatic and crop similarity are Willamette, southern Oregon, lower Columbia and Columbia basin.

Production studies made by L. R. Breithaupt, extension economist and former Malheur county agent, as regards wheat and dairy products, the two commodities in the farm act of most vital concern to Oregon, show that the Blue Mountain division produces 36 per cent of the wheat output for Oregon. The specialists recommend range and farm pastures as a substitute for wheat in the event of acreage reduction.

As to dairy cattle numbers, records show that the Blue Mountain division controls 17 per cent. No hint as to how the dairy adjustment work is to be handled aside from through marketing agreements has been received, Maris states, but if decrease in dairy cattle numbers is attempted no reduction in forage acreage this year would be justified because of the prospective shortage for fall and winter due to adverse weather conditions.

The normal egg had been surrounded with the white of another egg and the soft membrane shell.

Two lumber mill's reopened in Baker Monday with employment of 150 men. The mills have been closed since last October.

OUR RUBBER DOLLAR

Since money has become rather hard to get, it has been the topic of much interest throughout the country. For instance, A. D. Moses, has entered an essay contest on "Changing the Money System." A reformer of note Prof. Irving Fisher would have money managed to prevent flexibility of the dollar.

Two attributes to the dollar are of interest to society—its weight and value. Today most of us say its value is the more important. We have been told by statisticians that it is a 23.22-grains-of-fine-gold-dollar. Does this mean much? Not to the average American. He cannot eat gold, or use it for clothing or shelter. What interests him is what the dollar is worth in these things he can use.

The command of the dollar over commodities is not static and this instability is the cause of more disturbance than almost any other factor. People are at the mercy of the rubber dollar which stretches and contracts, changing all economic relations. When it stretches in its command over goods and services, it will ruin debtors, who as the country's producers have to go into debt before they can produce. When it contracts it ruins the creditors. Such flexibility is a challenge to human management.

The Christian Science Monitor, in an editorial, pointed out that curious thing about the enlargement of the dollar on the scale witnessed the last three years, or deflation, is that creditors are not so fortunate as theory would make them. Landlords, mortgage holders and bankers have found deflation very grievous.

The aim of any management of the dollar should be to make it stable. This is no doubt the goal of our government in which we are finding renewed faith.

Users of high pressure water for irrigation are notified that the City Council has divided the city into two zones with main street as the dividing line. Those living south of main street will have the use of the water on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays; those living north of main street on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays. Both zones may use it on Sundays.

The hours for irrigating are limited to from 5 o'clock p. m. to 9 o'clock p. m. on all days.

All irrigating must be done with sprinklers.

These regulations go into effect at once and apply to high pressure only. Low pressure may be used at any and all times as before.

Water users are further notified that the water will be turned off if they do not keep their water bills paid in full.
