

APPLE VALLEY HARVESTS PEAS

BABY DIES IN HARVEST CAMP DURING TORRID WEATHER LAST WEEK.

Apple Valley—Harvesting of the green pea crop in Apple Valley is well under way with over 200 pickers employed in the fields. The peas are said to be of excellent quality, superior to those of other seasons.

Owing to the rush of farm work at this season, a shortage in labor was re-

ported from Apple Valley the forepart of the week. Wages are based on hampers, the pay being 17 cents per hamper with a 3-cent bonus for those who stay through the season. Wages range from around \$2 to \$3 per day, depending upon the picker.

During the hot spell of last week, an infant died in one of the pea camps. Its parents being transient who are here for the harvest. The child was buried at Parma.

Apple thinning and haying add to the rush of farm work in this vicinity.
