

MALHEUR JOINS OREGON IN VOTE FAVORING REPEAL

**McCOY AND BLACKBAY WILL BE
DELEGATES TO REPEAL CON-
VENTION; SALES TAX IS SNOW-
ED UNDER.**

Malheur county stepped into the repeal parade, which swept over Oregon at the special election Friday, with a margin of 196 votes in favor of the repeal of the 18th amendment to the United States constitution. This county also joined the state in repealing the Oregon prohibition law and gave this measure a better margin than the federal repeal bill.

The vote for federal repeal was 963; against repeal 767.

As a result of the election, C. L. McCoy of Nyssa and J. R. Blackaby of Ontario will be sent to the state convention to place Malheur county formally in the repeal column.

This county overwhelmingly defeated the sales tax which failed to pass in Oregon. Sentiment proved heartily against the measure in almost every precinct and every county. The Malheur vote on the various measures, follows:

McCoy and Blackaby Are Delegates To Repeal Convention August 7th

With 111 repeal delegates duly elected from the state at large, C. L. McCoy of Nyssa and J. R. Blackaby of Ontario will go to Salem, August 7 to cast Malheur county's formal vote on the repeal of the 18th amendment. Of the total of 116 delegates elected Friday, only five are pledged to support retention of the prohibition amendment while 111 are pledged to vote for repeal.

Governor Meier announced Monday that the repeal convention would be held on August 7. A movement is under way to make George L. Baker, former mayor of Portland, convention chairman.

Only two counties in Oregon favored retention. They were Benton and Linn, with five dry delegates.

In Malheur county, as in the state, the Oregon repeal measure carried by considerably more votes than did federal repeal. Those who analyzed the condition said this was because of the

That Mrs. Smith owes her life and that of her wee daughter to Dr. J. J. Sarazin is the statement of the young husband who watched helplessly while the doctor performed a major operation to save the life of his wife. The doctor was called late in the night. When he arrived he found an emergency operation necessary, so under the domelight of a car he labored. He did his job well but no fee was forthcoming as the Nebraskan had no money.

Nyssa women have been kind to the young mother and her "camp" baby as they have taken her clothing and food, said Dr. Sarazin.

Nyssa folks rolled up their sleeves and unbuttoned their collars Monday for what has been the hottest week of the summer. Monday was the hottest day, according to the official report of H. R. Otis, who keeps the government station at Adrian, but residents of this section continued to sweeter each afternoon with the mercury well above the century mark.

Relief from high temperatures is promised by forecasters but little relief has materialized so far. Humidity was lower yesterday making the temperature seem higher.

Many young people and others have found some relief by frequent swims in Snake river or the Shoestring swimming hole. It is said a "nuddist" colony has taken possession of a river beach some distance north of the bridge. They find relief from the heat by occupying the rendezvous from dawn until dusk.

Hay Growers May Inspect Alfalfa Trials On Friday

If hay growers of Malheur county are concerned over bacterial wilt which has cut down the yield in many alfalfa fields, they will make the most of an opportunity Friday to look over fifty varieties of alfalfa which are growing in test plots on the J. C. Sparks farm, formerly owned by V. V. Hickox, in Big Bend. County Agent R. G. Larson has planned an inspection for all farmers at the Sparks farm Friday at 1:30 o'clock.

Mr. Larson states that the Russian varieties are proving the most resistant to wilt.

During the past few years he has been attempting to find such a variety for the reason that wilt has cost hay growers of Malheur county thousands of dollars each season.

DRIVERS MUST GET LICENSES

**HOSS WARNS OREGON MOTOR-
ISTS TO SECURE LICENSES BE-
FORE SEPTEMBER.**

Unless early action is taken, fully two-thirds of the automobile drivers in this vicinity will be subject to arrest on the morning of September 1st for failure to obtain their new drivers licenses, according to information just received from Hal E. Hoss, Secretary of State. An official estimate discloses that barely one-third of the drivers in this section are equipped with proper drivers' licenses.

Police permits are being granted that no motorists will be granted and a strict enforcement of the law will be observed in their check on all operators. With the "dead-line" barely four weeks away, all persons still carrying cards issued before July 1, 1931, should obtain new cards at the first opportunity, Hoss warned.

Renewal permits are being granted without examination to all operators previously licensed in Oregon under the age of 70, those with clean accident records and those without physical defects. All applications must be made on regular forms supplied by the Secretary of State and must be signed in the presence of a notary public, or other person authorized to administer oaths. Examiners will perform notarial duties without charge. It was pointed out.

ROOSEVELT NAMES DANA DIRECTOR OF BIG PUBLIC WORKS

**FRIEND OF OWYHEE AND VALE
PROJECTS WILL SERVE ON
BOARD OF TEN WHICH WILL
DIRECT PUBLIC WORKS.**

President Roosevelt Tuesday appointed Marshall N. Dana of Portland one of ten regional advisors to the public works administration and named the headquarters of the regions in which the three billion dollars public works fund will be spent. Portland will be headquarters for Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Washington. The position carries an annual salary of \$6000.

Perhaps no section in Oregon is more pleased by Mr. Dana's appointment than Malheur county whose reclamation program has benefited on many occasions through the efforts of Mr. Dana. He was instrumental in securing the recent \$5,000,000 appropriation for Owyhee and \$1,000,000 for Vale.

In accepting the public works office, Mr. Dana expressed gratification of an opportunity to render public service to the states of the Pacific northwest.

From Washington came word Sunday that the Owyhee appropriation will employ 1500 men on this job for a year as most of the allocation will go for labor on canal construction. Vale's million will employ 350 men, the report said.

BLAZE DAMAGES GOSHERT HOME ON HOTTEST DAY

**HEAT EXPLODES OILED RAGS AND
SETS PORCH ABLAZE; FIREMEN
SAVE RESIDENCE BY QUICK
WORK.**

Monday's scorching heat, which mounted to 106, is blamed for a fire at the S. D. Goshert home which resulted in damage estimated at several hundred dollars. The intense heat is believed to have caused spontaneous combustion in a pile of oiled cloths which had been left on the porch. That or defective wiring was the cause of the fire which frightened the town during the hottest hour of an exceedingly hot day.

Had it not been for the work of volunteer firemen of the city, the entire residence and furnishings would have burned. Within a moment after the fire was noticed, it spread into the dry timbers of the roof. The back porch was burned away, also the rear wall and roof of the kitchen. A few valued furnishings were a total loss. Rooms were badly smoked.

Members of the family were in the front yard when the little Sales girl noticed smoke gushing from the porch. Firemen answered the alarm with speed and in a few moments had the blaze under control.

The fire occurred about 5:30 o'clock when many residents of the city were using high pressure water for irrigation. When faucets were turned off, the flow was adequate but would have been insufficient had the fire reached greater proportions. As a safety measure, the city fire chief requests that every faucet be turned off when a fire alarm is sounded in the future.

Firemen experienced much difficulty in transporting the chemical wagon to the scene as wheels on the cart collapsed. An effort will be made at once to improve equipment and possibly motorize the more essential pieces.
