

WHEAT GROWERS CAN SPEED NEW ALLOTMENT PLAN

EACH FARMER IS REQUESTED TO
DETERMINE AVERAGE PRODUCTION; TEMPORARY COMMITTEE
IS NAMED.

Wheat growers of Malheur county can hasten the wheat adjustment program and expedite their own cash benefits by preparing their own records of wheat production for the past three years, five years if possible, County Agent R. G. Larson informed The Journal Tuesday.

A preliminary committee, working with Mr. Larson, has divided the county into eight communities as required under the organization set-up. Assisting this preliminary committee are Joe Brumbach, Big Bend; Maurice L. Judd, Kingman Colony and Owyhee; Frank Morgan, Nyssa; H. E. Noah, Ontario; Clifton Blackley, Oregon Slope and Weiser; J. E. Russel, Vale; Earl Flock, Harper and Westfall. The other unit is Jamieson and Brogan.

Growers Asked to Help
By use of threshing machine records, warehouse receipts or other information, each grower is to figure out not only his acreage but his production for the past three years at least, and preferably for five years. That means first of all for the crop years 1930, 1931 and 1932, and if possible for the years 1929 and 1928 as well.

Once the individual grower's past average production is determined and accepted, allotment will be simple as it is fixed at 5 per cent of the average annual production—unless crop failure or other special circumstances during the base period make some adjustment necessary.

Malheur Stake Large
Malheur county, with a total average annual production of 330,666 bushels, has a real "stake" in the success of the wheat plan, first results of which will be cash payment beginning this fall. The county has been given an allotment of 195,301 bushels which means that this amount times 20 cents or \$39,062.20 is the amount of cash available this fall if all wheat growers in the county joined the plan. In addition, from \$15,624.08 to \$19,530.00 will be forthcoming next spring.

Local Problem
Appointment of the temporary campaign committee emphasizes the idea that local farmers will themselves be in charge of the administration of the plan. The final permanent association will consist of three members from each of the eight districts of this county. These community units will also elect their own members of the county board.

This association will check farm production statements, determine individual allotments, publish the list of allotment applications, and see that required acreage reductions are made, certifying facts to the national administration.

In this way the cost of local administration will be kept to a minimum and what expense is incurred will go largely to local people. Furthermore, the division of allotments will be made within a county by those who know local conditions, the government endorsing its work with the assigning of total county allotments.

JORDAN VALLEY TO VOTE ON GRAZING ON SEPTEMBER 8TH

STOCKMEN OF INTERIOR PRO-
CEED WITH ORGANIZATION UN-
DER NEW GRAZING LAW.

Friday, September 8, voters within the proposed Jordan Valley grazing district, now in the process of organization, will hold a special election for the purpose of approving or disapproving the organization of said district.

The petition for organization having been duly approved by the Malheur county grazing board, without a dissenting vote, and description of the proposed district having been made public by publication, the final step is the forthcoming special election. The said district is being organized under a new grazing law passed by the last session of the Oregon legislature, a former law adopted in 1923 having been found unconstitutional by the supreme court under a year ago.

The new law provides that only those receiving permits to graze within the district shall be permitted use of such grazing lands. Permits shall be granted by the county grazing board which consists of the three members of the county board and the county veterinarian.

The proposed Jordan Valley district comprises a large body of desert land in eastern and southern Malheur county, running to the Idaho line. Stockmen who have taken an active part in petitioning for the district are Lee Strode, Wm. Malver, Holmes Glover, LaVerne Anawalt, Andrew Cunningham, Thomas Cowgill, Marion Wroten and Andrew Greeley.

Stockmen in all parts of Malheur county are watching the organization with much interest and will probably take similar steps to limit grazing in their districts if the organization is made effective. Jordan stockmen are also the first in the state to organize under the new law.

HANEY HEADS STATE PUBLIC WORKS BOARD

Bert E. Haney was elected chairman of the advisory board for Oregon under the federal public works administration in Portland Friday. C. C. Hockley and R. N. Stanfield, the other members attended, as did Marshall N. Dana, regional adviser.

Portland was recommended as Oregon headquarters for the public works administration.

The question of the priority of projects as filed with the governor's reconstruction board or to be received direct by the federal advisory board was disposed of in the terse expression that priority would be "established in accordance with the judgment of the advisory board."

At the same time full consideration is to be given projects previously filed with the governor's board.

A statement issued after an executive session indicates that full speed ahead on Oregon projects is anticipated with announcement from Washington of the engineer assigned to the Oregon board.

CITY REFUNDS BONDS

STATE ASSEMBLY RATIFIES REPEAL BY 110 TO FIVE

C. L. MCCOY AND J. R. BLACKBAY
CAST REPEAL BALLOTS FOR
MALHEUR COUNTY; MAYOR
BAKER IN ACTION.

The Oregon constitutional convention, by a vote of 110 to 5, late Monday in Salem adopted a resolution favoring repeal of the 18th amendment. All delegates followed the instructions of the majority vote of their respective counties. C. L. McCoy of Nyssa and J. R. Blackabay of Ontario, elected on the repeal platform, cast their votes accordingly.

Mrs. David T. Honeymann of Portland was elected president of the convention, her name having been presented by ex-Mayor George L. Baker of that city, who paid tribute to her work. "Mrs. Honeymann has labored to bring about a better understanding of the repeal campaign with the thought that the country has drifted into a state of chaos and there is defiance of law and order," said Baker. "We are through with hypocrisy and want a return of temperance and respect for law."

When someone suggested from the gallery that Mayor Baker greet Mrs. Honeymann as he did the famous actress Mary Garden, he stooped slightly and kissed her on the cheek.

Mrs. C. S. Jackson of Portland proposed that the convention favor outlawing the saloon in Oregon, whereupon it was moved to adjourn. The motion carried. A number of delegates stated that a liquor control commission had been appointed by Governor Miller and that it was not within the scope of the convention to consider matters other than repeal.

At luncheon, the Salem Hop Growers' association entertained the delegates at the Hotel Marian.

WARRANTS ARE GOOD ON TAX PAYMENTS

Salem—County, school district and municipal warrants are acceptable in the payment of taxes and interest accruing thereon of such respective taxing agencies, Attorney General Van Winkle declared in an opinion for Fred Pinsky, district attorney of Wheeler county. Pinsky asked particularly if interest and penalty on taxes could also be paid by warrants. The attorney-general ruled in the affirmative.

MALHEUR EXCELS IN WHEAT PRODUCTION

The official allotment of wheat production in Oregon revealed a fact of particular interest to Malheur county, one in which the county can take much pride although it was not mentioned by the allotment board. The Oregon table disclosed that Malheur's average production of golden grain is the highest in the entire state. Malheur's 5-year average is 32.5 bushels. Washington county comes second with 29.1 bushels.

LIVE WIRE BLOWS DOWN AT DESERET; WILSON JUMPS IT

A high tension power line, carrying 11,000 volts of electricity, was torn down by the windstorm Tuesday near the Deseret sheep ranch when the storm reached almost cyclonic proportions around 5:30 o'clock. Panels of wood were blown about like bits of paper. When one of them struck the power line the wire came down and started several small fires in an open field. A fence nearby was electrified and flames were shooting everywhere.

Vern Wilson, one of the first men to run toward the flames, narrowly escaped the live wire which was on the ground. He jumped over it, coming too near for comfort. The power was turned off before any great damage was done.

A threshing crew had just finished the day's work when the storm struck the Deseret.

I-O-N HIGHWAY WINS SUPPORT

HEWES SUGGESTS THAT IDAHO
SHARE COST OF BUILDING
ROAD FROM HOMEDALE TO JORDAN VALLEY.

Washington—After a conference yesterday with Doctor Hewes, western head of the bureau of public roads, Senator Pope of Idaho expressed a view that the I. O. N. road which would give southwest Idaho a direct outlet to California, is nearer consummation than ever before.

Doctor Hewes is on his way west, and will confer with District Engineer Finch at Ogden, and later with the highway commissions of Oregon and Idaho, in an attempt to bring about an agreement on a compromise plan for completing the missing link in this highway, between Homedale and Jordan Valley.

Inasmuch as this road is said to be of primary benefit to Idaho, but must largely run through a sparsely settled section of Oregon, Doctor Hewes has suggested a change of route running south in Idaho about half the distance, then crossing into Oregon, but with the understanding that Idaho shall contribute a major part of the cost out of its federal aid highway fund. Hewes assured Senator Pope this arrangement can be made under the highway act, and he has unofficial advice that such a plan would be favorably received by the states most concerned. If the states agree, Hewes sees no reason why the project should not be placed under construction in the not distant future.

LEGIONAIRES ATTEND KLAMATH CONVENTION

Don M. Graham, state committee member of the American Legion, and C. L. McCoy, commander of the Nyssa Post, are local delegates at the annual state convention of the Legion in Klamath Falls this week. Mrs. Graham and Mrs. McCoy will represent the Nyssa Auxiliary. Tuesday the Grahams left for Klamath, accompanied by R. G. Larson, commander and delegate of the Ontario Post. Mr. and Mrs. McCoy went on to Klamath Falls from Salem where they attended the repeal convention on Monday.

LANGTON BUILDS NEW ROADHOUSE

James Langton, owner of the Koozy Cafe, is building a roadhouse at the junction of the Nyssa-Adrian highway and the cut-off to Owyhee dam. He plans to open the stand soon. Beer and lunches will be served.

Nyssa Stores Get Ready For New Deal In Business; Adopt New Closing Hours

While there are but few business concerns in Nyssa which would strictly come under the N. R. A. program, now being organized by the federal government under the leadership of President Roosevelt, there is a general willingness to join in the plan looking to industrial recovery and the movement is being heartily supported here.

Set Closing Hours
Grocers and other retailers of Nyssa and Adrian, under fair practice codes submitted, agreed at a meeting last Thursday to adopt a schedule of uniform working hours for the purpose of better upholding the regulations of the national recovery act. Hours long in effect in other towns of the Snake river valley were approved. Stores will open at 8 in the morning and close at 5:30 p. m. daily except on Saturday when they will remain open till 9 p. m. Similar hours were adopted in Ontario. Working hours will total 60 1/2 hours per week, eight hours over the minimum. Maximum hours per employee will be 48 hours per week. Other rules of the retail code are awaited and will be observed, firms say.

SPUD SHIPMENTS REACH 24 CARS WORTH \$14,400

C. VAN ZELF REPORTS BIG YIELD
ON TWO ACRES; ALFALFA SEED
CROPS ARE EXCELLENT.

Harvest of the early potato crop reached its peak in Nyssa this week with the loading of eight more cars. This brings shipments for the season to 24 cars, valued at approximately \$14,400. This year the grower is receiving around \$600 for a carload, containing around 320 sacks per car, while last season he received a pittance of \$60 per car.

Eight carloads of wheat were received by the Nyssa Elevator during the week from the Homedale section. Three carloads of wheat were shipped from Adrian.

Golden are the stories of potato crops which brought the first good income in several years to lucky farmers of this area. C. Van Zelf cropped over 200 sacks to the acre which brought him \$800 for a 2-acre patch. R. H. Young of Parma is said to have cropped 315 sacks to the acre. Joe Watanabe of Cairo 225 sacks to the acre from a 10-acre field.

Alfalfa Certified
Felton Duncan has a prize field of Ladak alfalfa which has been inspected by County Agent Larson for certification. Larson believes the 7-acre tract will make some splendid seed. Mr. Larson has also inspected around 500 acres of Grimm alfalfa which is being raised for seed. One of the largest and best crops is that of Haga and Stultz at Danner. Trent Johnson of Vale has another good crop.

CIVIC CLUB WILL HOLD GARDEN FETE

Mrs. C. C. Hunt's division of Nyssa Civic club will hold the annual social meeting Wednesday, August 16, at the Barrett garden in Arcadia. Cars will leave from the Eagles hall at 2 o'clock with a committee in charge of transportation. Visitors from Ontario, Parma and Vale, who were guests at the meeting at the Barrett home a year ago, will be invited to attend next Wednesday. Nyssa and Colony ladies usually attend en masse so a large crowd is expected. No program is planned as all guests enjoy the opportunity to inspect Mrs. Barrett's large variety of rockery and garden plants.

VALE CONTRACTOR GETS OWYHEE JOB

R. F. Nichol, Vale contractor, has bid in the concrete structure work on the Owyhee canal contract now under construction by J. A. Terteling company. Nichol in turn will let a contract for hauling sand from the Lakey pit near Ontario or from Dunaway to the job. Nichol plans to have about eight men on the job in the very near future, he told The Journal when in Nyssa Monday. His crew will stay at the Terteling camp.

DRIVER'S EXAMS HERE AUGUST 17th

Nyssa Stores Get Ready For New Deal In Business; Adopt New Closing Hours

More Employment Wanted
Hugh S. Johnson, N. R. A. chief, stated today: "Operating hours of retail stores shall not be reduced below 52 hours unless they had been less before July. The actual intent of the agreement is that there should be no shortening of hours but the employment of additional helpers. The agreement is a solemn covenant."

Larger companies are already making arrangements for the employment of extra help wherever possible. It has been announced that the code does not effect firms which do not employ more than one person.

Praise Oregon Towns
"The attitude in Oregon towns is wonderful," said Frank Messenger, administrator for Oregon and Idaho. "There is some chiseling, it is true but not much. The only complaints are resulting from the puzzling conditions that are hard to conform to the new regulations."
