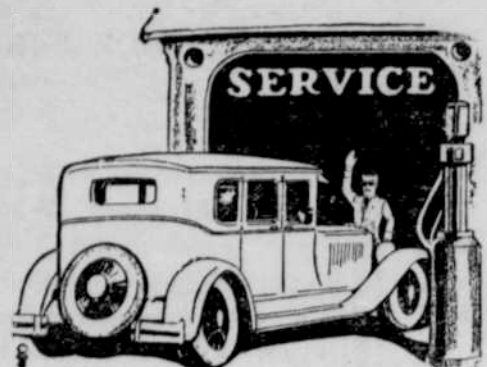

tion to deal immediately with applications for funds for non-federal projects in Oregon.

Mr. Hockley is a well known Portland engineer. He was recommended for state administrator of public works. Then the administration decided upon regional supervision and gave the post to Marshall N. Dana. Hockley was made a member of the state advisory board with Robert N. Stanfield and Bert E. Haney.

Construction of sewage systems in all Oregon towns without them has been approved as worthwhile public works. The government will give such projects a 30 per cent outright grant and a low interest, long time loan to take care of the balance of the cost. Believing no such opportunity will again be presented, the city council of Nyssa is preparing an application for a sewage system loan.

C. E. Green, sanitary engineer of the board of health, has urged the council to enter the application. He was here recently and stated that the project is a necessity and a safeguard to public health. He conferred with Fred McConnell, engineer, in regard to specifications and cost estimate.

BORROWERS MAY GET HARVEST LOANS

"Borrowers from the government seed loan office, who are without funds or other means of credit, may use the proceeds of a portion of their 1933 crop to defray actual harvest and threshing expenses providing an equal amount is applied on the Government loan, according to a statement issued this week by L. J. Paulson, manager of the loan office at Minneapolis.

Without requiring the filing of liens the government has authorized buyers to permit harvesting and threshing allowances in amounts not to exceed a total of \$2 per acre upon presentation of receipted statements for such expenditures, providing remittances are made on parity. When other liens holders are involved, their rights must be given the consideration their secured position requires.

The plan will work as follows: Where a farmer is otherwise unable to pay harvesting expenses of, for example, \$50, he must market \$100 worth of grain. In this case the buyer would be authorized to allow necessary expenses up to \$50 and to remit the other \$50 to the government seed loan office toward the payment of the government loan.

It is anticipated that all grain buyers will follow the procedure adopted last year in making a check for the harvesting and threshing expenses directly to those who furnished equipment, supplies, or labor, thus insuring payment of the bill for the protection of the buyer.

Wheat Allotment Plan

For the information of wheat growers of this vicinity, The Journal is reprinting a simple explanation of the allotment plan which came from Washington.

Who is to put the plan into operation?

Wheat farmers through voluntary contracts with the secretary of agriculture.

How is the contract made?

The producer first signs an application agreeing to contract to reduce his wheat acreage for the 1934-1935 crop years, in consideration of adjustment payments. When this application is accepted by the allotment committee of his county, he is offered a contract for his signature which, when accepted by the secretary of agriculture becomes effective.

What is the allotment committee? Three members of the board of directors of the county wheat production control association. The latter includes farmers signing applications with the aid of the county agent.

Who can join in the plan? All producers who have seeded land to wheat during each or any of the years, 1930, 1931 and 1932.

Can a contract be signed covering a farm on which wheat has not been grown or on which no wheat is to be grown in 1934 and 1935?

No.

What does the contract require the producer to do?

To reduce his wheat acreage for the 1934 and 1935 crop years below the average for 1928-32 by not to exceed 20 per cent. The amount of the 1934 reduction is to be announced August 24, that for 1934 a year hence.

Miss Helen Carns of Meridian and her brother Donald, were week end guests of Miss Jeanette Martin.

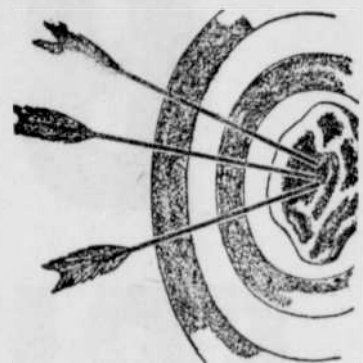
