

BODY OF MINER FOUND IN CABIN

Malheur—The body of Newton R. Vaughn, elderly mining man, who apparently died in his cabin in the Mormon Basin section three weeks ago, was found Sunday by Raymond Butler, a mining prospector.

Mr. Vaughn was born in Clinton, Mo., December 18, 1852, and spent many years in Baker county. He is said to have owned mining property in the Mormon Basin section for 25 or 30 years.

Mr. Vaughn's partner, Edward K. Starr, died in the same cabin June 21. Mr. Vaughn walked three miles for help when his partner became ill, but

Mr. Starr died before neighbors arrived at the cabin.

The deceased is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Mary Slaughter, a former Baker resident.

DEPUTY INVESTIGATES INSURANCE COMPANY

La Grande, R. C. Stevinin, deputy to A. H. Averill, state insurance commissioner, is investigating the Idaho Benevolent society, a mutual insurance company. Stevinin said the company was unauthorized to sell insurance in this state and that agents are not and cannot be licensed. He informed state police to pick up any persons soliciting for this company or any other similar mutual assessment insurance company. The Idaho Benevolent was found to be operating in Nyssa, Ontario and other Eastern Oregon points he said, adding that Oregon is the only state in the northwest which has protective insurance laws that may stop soliciting for this type of insurance.

ETHICS OF BANKING

The function of a bank is, after all, a quasi-public one, and the banker who has no regard for the ultimate prosperity of his customers and his community will be very quickly condemned by the common sense of the latter, and will ultimately destroy not merely his own reputation but also bring about the downfall of his community.

In other words, the prosperity of a bank is founded upon the prosperity of the community and country in which it is situated.

Banker in Strategic Position

The banker has always held a strategic position in the business world, and obviously the first requisite necessary is that the banker shall be honest. I do not mean with "honest" merely that he should be honest to the extent that he would not embezzle funds or swindle his customers and clients. The honesty to which I refer must be of a much higher and greater type.

He must be willing to forego momentary advantages because in the long run the specific action may bring harm to his customers or possibly to business generally.
