IN PENDLETON NRA MEANS BIG SHOW

N R A means "New Round-Up Attitude" in Pendleton, where folks have set their hearts on making the Round-Up, September 21, 22, and 23 a worthy successor to the long chain of breath taking cowboy spectacles that have spread the fame of Oregon around the world.

Out of this new Round-Up attitude, comes the announcement that the management has "taken the bit between their teeth" and boldly slashed admission prices for the September classic. Reserved seats that used to cost \$2.50 are made available this year for \$1.50 and \$1.25, while bleacher seats are to be sold for 75 cents.

"At these pre-war time prices we hope, and expect, to pack 30,000 people in the stands daily," business manager Roy W. Ritter said. "What we want is twice as many visitors seeing the Round-Up at half the price of recent years—in other words, volume of people rather than mere volume of revenue. The Pendleton Round-Up stands alone in that it is put on for the enjoyment of the folks in the northwest and to advertise the whole northwest through-out the country."

Home Corner

Corn may be preserved for winter use in stone jars by packing in salt or brine. 1 pound salt to 4 pounds corn. Husk the ears of corn and remove the silk. Cook in boiling water for about 2 minutes to set the milk, cut the corn from the cob with a sharp knife. Sprinkle a layer of salt in the bottom of the crock, then a layer of corn, then salt, and repeat until the jar is full, top layer of salt. Place plate over the top of the corn, to press down well. Let stand overnight. If sufficient brine has not formed in 24 hours, add 1 pound of salt to 2 quarts of water and pour enough of this brine over the corn to cover well. Cover with a cloth, then a plate or board and a weight. Wash off the cloth if scum arises. When ready to use, soak overnight, then prepare as fresh corn.

GRASSHOPPERS LAY EGGS IN EARLY FALL

Looking ahead to a possible grasshopper outbreak next year, farmers might save themselves much future loss by spotting grasshopper egg beds at this season, says Don C. Mote, entomologist at O. S. C. Trained observers report that it is about time to expect another bad outbreak of some species such as was experienced in 1915-1917 and again in 1922-23.

Swarms of grasshoppers milling around in the air or thickly bunched on the ground usually indicate they are looking for egg-laying areas on dry meadows or dry spots in irrigated districts or fields. Observation of the hill grasshoppers in parts of eastern Oregon is also recommended, as it is about time for them to become abundant. Destruction of egg beds is one of the most successful methods of fighting the hoppers.
