

BET MONEY GOES TO COUNTY FAIR

The best laid plans of lobbyists and legislators often go haywire. The last session enacted a law providing for the apportionment of a certain portion of the revenues from pari-mutual betting on horse and dog races among county fairs of the state. Officials of the state association of county fairs who engineered the legislation estimated that there were not to exceed 20 active fairs in the state which would participate in

this division of the spoils. Now, however, Attorney General Van Winkle has ruled that every county which has a county fair board is entitled to a share in this fund. This inducement has resulted in the sudden revival of a number of fairs which had folded up their tent and quit. Now, instead of the anticipated 20 fairs to share in the apportionment of the \$18,000 now available for county fair purposes there are 31, with the quota for each proportionately reduced.

This year the Malheur county fair is receiving premium money only from the state. However, merchants are giving additional prizes which will add materially to the awards offered exhibitors.

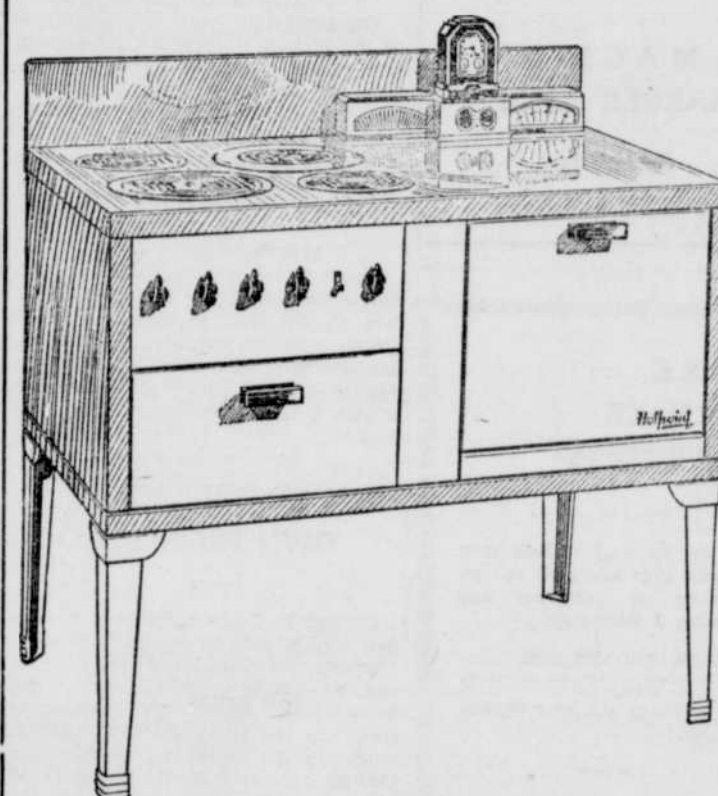
