STATE CONTROL OF
LIQUOR IS FIXED

Of interest to Malheur county was the report of Governor Meier's liquor committee which made the following recommendations for passage at the next session of the legislature in the event the repeal of the 18th amendment is ratified in the near future. Basic recommendations were:

Sale of liquor of more than 14 per cent alcohol by volume through state liquor stores, the licensing of grocery and drug stores to sell wines and liquors below that percentage, the issuing of permits at \$1 to persons qualified to purchase liquor and the allocation of funds derived from liquor taxes on a basis of 25 per cent to the state and 75 per cent to the counties.

The committee recommended the establishment of a state liquor commission, consisting of three members appointed by the governors, serving without pay for six years each.

TRAINING FOR DISABLED

Training physically handicapped persons for suitable jobs will be undertaken in every community in Oregon, according to Oscar I. Paulson, state supervisor of vocational rehabilitation, Salem. The service is available to those above 16 years of age. Those vocationally handicapped either because of injury or disease should present their cases and an immediate survey will be made.

Nyssa Commercial club has had three signs erected on the Idaho side directing motorists this way. Two signs were erected near the junction with the Caldwell road beyond Notus while the third was placed on the new Parma-Fruitland highway a mile from town.

FARMERS CAN SIGN
FOR WHEAT MONEY

With the deadline for signing applications for wheat allotments set forward until October 25, a final effort is being made by County Agent Larson to acquaint every wheat grower with the benefits of the act. This is his last chance to get an allotment for the coming two years.

There has been some discussion of the possibility of growing seed crops on the contracted acreage and up until now it has been thought that any crop now in the surplus column might be produced. However, this idea is corrected with the information that "No crops or products can be grown on a contracted acreage for sale directly or indirectly." There is no exception to this rule. It applies to eastern and western Oregon. Hay or seed can be grown for work stock used on the farm. But hay or feed cannot be grown for feeding to milk or meat animals, wherein the product is sold off the farm.

Another quotation from the message follows: "Cooperating wheat growers are paid substantial benefits to reduce wheat acreage and use land in such way as not to create possible surplus of other agricultural commodities. The act does not contemplate use of contracted acreage as means of promoting other farm enterprises to in any way compete with other producers who do not have the advantage of benefit payments."

McKENNON GETS
GILLIAM POST

Russel McKennon, formerly assistant county agent and club leader in Malheur county, has been appointed county agent of Gilliam county with headquarters in Condon. He was temporarily assigned to that post two weeks ago to handle the wheat allotment work in that county. Monday, came the announcement that his appointment was made permanent.

Malheur county friends regret Mr. McKennon's departure as he was particularly successful in 4-H club work. His successor in this county will be named soon, according to County Agent R. G. Larson.
