RELIEF WORK IS FEDERAL PROBLEM SAYS LOCAL HEAD

Note: Robert D. Lytle, chairman of the Malheur County relief committee, wrote the following letter in answer to up-staters who contend that relief of the destitute is a "local problem."

To the Editor: Friday night the president spoke for ten minutes to the women's third annual conference on current problems.

Among other things, he said we were suffering from the high cost of local government and the wrong kind of local politics. If that statement expresses a conviction, how can he square that conviction with the failure, in his home state's effort to shake off the grip of Tammany, to take a part in the hazard of that fight and assume a part of its responsibility?

Your Saturday editorial "Relief on Slow Wing" touches on the attitude of some up-staters toward Portland relief. Those persons are viewing relief from the standpoint of theory of five years ago, that the relief of the destitute is a "local problem." It is true that in past years the poor in each community belonged to that community. Probably they were reared and had lived their lives there. At any rate there had been a period of several years of residence and almost always the cause of the destitution, whatever it may have been, was found in the community.

The order has changed. This the complaining up-staters fail to accept. In the first place it is not the poor in the generally accepted sense who present the great problem. It is those steady, reliable and self respecting men of labor and the trades—the backbone of the state—who, with their families, constitute the bulk of demand on relief funds. Those men to whom work is the natural thing and who suffer untold humiliation because of having to accept public aid, are the ones of whom we should aid, in every manner possible, to maintain their self respect.

These men are constantly seeking labor, Portland is our industrial center, naturally these men pour into Portland looking for jobs. If the up-state had work for its own men, Portland could easily care for its own relief problem. When you take up an examination and study of the several county "case roads," you will become convinced as I have been, that relief and the care of the needy is no longer a local problem, but is a state and federal problem and it is the duty of the state in conjunction with the federal government to provide the funds and to administer those funds.
