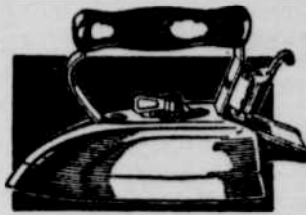


Miss Sterling Weds Payette Youth Saturday
