LEST WE FORGET

November 11, brings another Armistice Day, a day for remembering.

For remembering the great conflict which came to an end just 15 years ago; for remembering the joy of the war-weary world when it turned its back on death and destruction and lifted its face to the clear skies of peace; for remembering the men and women who offered their lives for their country—those who remained "over there" as well as those who came back.

And do you remember when they came home and

marched through the streets, they wore little patches of color of different design on their left shoulders? That was the insignia of the various divisions in the American forces. There were 93 divisions and each one had its own insignia. Throughout long, hard years, that little emblem was an incentive to good conduct and coordinated effort among the doughboys.

Many of the boys who came from the "land of setting sun," the west, were members of the 41st division. The emblem of the "Sunset Division," depicted a setting sun on a half circle of red, surrounded by a black border. This division was made up of guardsmen from Oregon, Idaho, Washington and a few other states.

Whatever the emblem they wore, they were all heroes when they came back, 15 years ago. We honored their sacrifice, their loyalty to humanity. But it is easy for us to forget. That is why our government made an Armistice Day—a day for remembering.

SHALL RECLAMATION GO ON?

When the National Reclamation Association meets at Bois this month in connection with the conference of Governors of the 11 western states which are vitally interested in the irrigation of arid lands, the question to be determined will be whether the association is to continue its fight for the principle of government aid to reclamation projects.

No other agency exists anywhere for that purpose.

No other organization is available anywhere to look after the interests of the reclamation states.

If the National Reclamation Association is disbanded, with it will go the only coordinated organization in the Western states that can be called upon for leadership in pressing for the reclamation rights of the west in congress, or to defend the principle of federal aid to reclamation from the unjust and unwarranted attacks of those who have heretofore and will again try to obstruct western development of resources and culture.

The work of reclaiming arid lands by irrigation in this state will not be completed until the last available drop of water has been put to work on dry land. Until that situation prevails there is use for the NRA (National Reclamation Association.)

The organization demonstrated its worth last winter when it battled for and secured an 18 months moratorium on the payment of money due the government from project settlers, when it secured aid for projects in distress and when it aroused the people west of the Rocky mountains to the injustice in the proposal by Eastern interests that congress withdraw its support of the established principle that the government shall cooperate with Western states in building irrigation works.

Tamale Pie

3 cups cold, chopped cooked meat
1 onion, finely chopped
2 tablespoons butter
1 pimienta
1 green pepper
1 clove of garlic if desired
2 tomatoes peeled and cut in pieces, or
1 cup of canned tomatoes.

Cook the onion in melted butter till golden brown. Add chopped peppers, garlic and tomatoes. Season with salt and celery salt and add chopped meat. Place in buttered baking dish and spread over the top thick cornmeal mush. Brown in a moderate oven for half an hour. Serve with a large salad of green vegetables to make a whole meal.

Let potatoes stand 15 minutes in hot water before baking and it will take half the usual time to bake them.

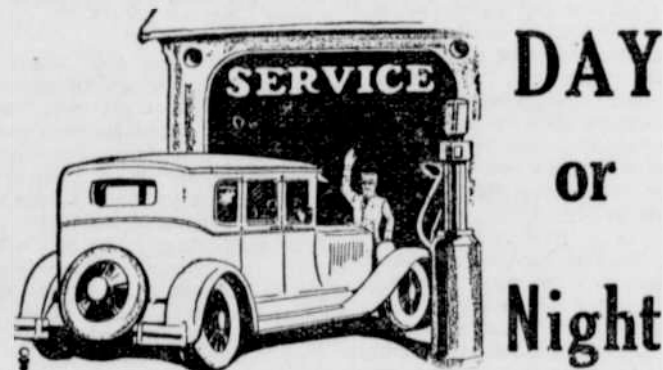

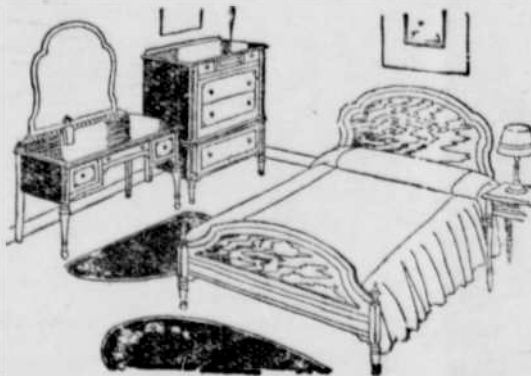
