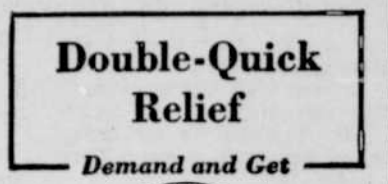
IDAHO UTILITY PLAYS TAX GATHERER ROLE

Boise—(Special)—The extent to which public utilities have become tax-gathering agencies is vividly illustrated in a recent study made on the basis of 1932 reports of the various utilities to the public utilities commission.
To put it in a nutshell, the largest Idaho operator—on the basis of whose reports this study was made—pay to the state 17.2 cents out of every dollar its customer pay into it, or 29.89 cents for every dollar operating expense, or 40.34 cents out of every dollar of net revenue. This is purely for state, county and other similar taxes and does not take into account the sixty-odd thousand dollars of federal taxes paid.
Or, figuring another way, every kilowatt hour of electricity sold in the state carries slightly more than a half cent of taxes.
The company in 1932 had an operating revenue of \$3,673,757.09 from its Idaho properties; in other words, sold juice representing that sum to customers in the state of Idaho. This represented a total of 118,552,472 kilowatt hours. This income is called gross operating revenue.

Red Cross Appeals for Members

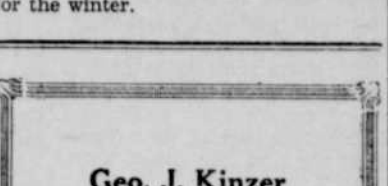
