A joint installation of all Malheur county grange officers will be held at Vale early in December. Officers will

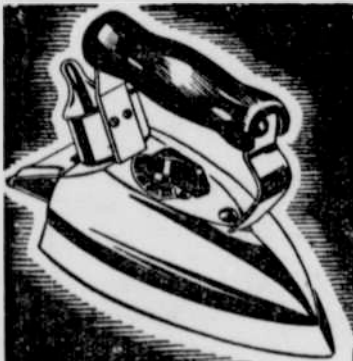

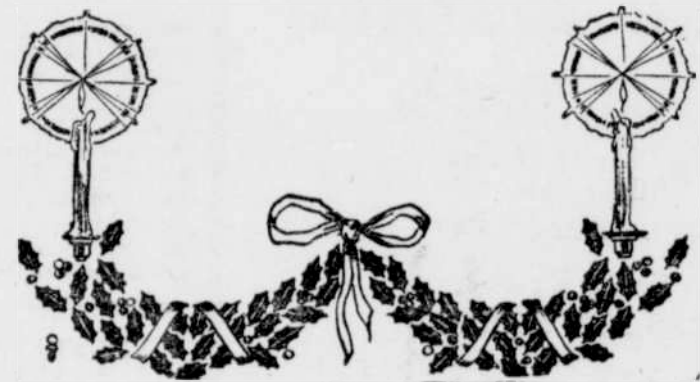
