WHEAT REDUCTION
IS REQUISITE TO
U. S. SEED LOANS

The wheat acreage for the coming year has been reduced in theory by 7,780,000 acres, under the wheat control plan, but now word comes from Washington that farmers not eligible for the wheat bonus will increase their acreage to a large extent.

To cope with the situation, announcement was made Tuesday that a requisite to federal loans for 1934 spring wheat production will be an agreement to reduce the seeded acreage 15 per cent.

Farmers who had an average of 80 acres or less are not affected so few growers in Malheur county will be affected by the new ruling.

CREDIT AID FOR
FARMERS IS AIM
OREGON COUNCIL

Cooperation to promote the refinancing of Oregon's agricultural industry is the first project agreed on by the Oregon Agricultural Advisory council recently appointed by Governor Meier on request of the Federal Farm Credit Administration. This decision was reached at the organization meeting of the council in Portland, said Pieter Tensen, Malheur county member. Mr. Tensen did not attend. To assist in the refinancing problems, the council will ask the governor to appoint county farm credit committees to serve voluntarily.

O. M. Plummer, manager of the Pacific International Livestock exposition was elected chairman of the council. Six district chairmen were elected who, with the officers, make up the executive committee. Fred Phillips, Baker, president Oregon Wool Growers' association is chairman of district 5 in which this county falls.

Governor Meier pointed out that the outstanding problem in farm finance at this time is that of getting land bank loans closed. This was further emphasized by G. L. Jordan who represented the farm credit administration at the meeting. He stated that thousands of land bank loans that have been approved have not been closed owing to difficulty and delay in working out an equitable agreement with creditors for the liquidation of the old debts out of the proceeds of the loan.

NATION'S BUSINESS
IS FAST IMPROVING

Business in the United States is fast nearing a firm foundation, and is definitely on the up-swing declared Dr. N. H. Comish, professor of business administration of the University of Oregon, who has been studying statistics and factors noted in many parts of the country. Gain in business of 160 per cent was made by 89 companies during the first nine months of 1933. Babson's figures show that business has improved as much as 25 per cent since last March, in spite of temporary setbacks. Employment of nearly 4,000,000 men formerly without work, curtailment of surplus production, elimination of unfair competitive practices and elimination of child labor were cited as forces that will make for improved business. Recognition of Russia and subsequent increased exports will definitely aid business, Dr. Comish said.
