The processor would no doubt pass the tax on to the retailer and he would pass it on to we folks who buy pork and chops. That was Uncle Sam's plan.

But the big packers as usual did not like a plan which made them no extra profits. In a speech at Sioux City, Iowa, last week, the manager of Swift and Company said, "All the packers can do is treat the processing tax as an additional expense which must be deducted from the price he pays for the live porkers. So the process tax is being passed back to the farmer." In other words, they refuse to obey the plain orders of Uncle Sam.

We hear a great deal about the "teeth" that are said to exist in recovery plans and we believe this is another instance when they must be put into use. Without his claws, the blue eagle would be a helpless bird. If he is not watching, the processing tax will not help the farmer but will penalize him.

LOOKING UP

An official survey by federal recovery agencies has disclosed that important business gains have been made in the last six months of 1933 in this section of country. Bank clearings, according to statements issued by the Portland branch of the federal reserve bank, increased 30 per cent in the last six months. The retail trade bureau of Portland Chamber of Commerce estimates pre-Christmas shopping increased 20 per cent in 1933 over a like period in 1932.

It was notable that increases in retail trade were all recorded in merchandise sold in the lower price brackets.

This augmented trade in lower priced merchandise indicates that the recovery program is succeeding in its first objective, which is distributing purchasing power among average families and the unemployed. It is the small family man who has been most benefitted by the re-employment made available under NRA codes and CWA work projects, and the retail trade figures show that this added money in circulation is quickly returning to trade channels.

All reemployment figures in Oregon, estimated and actual, indicate that not less than 60,000 persons have found work since federal recovery agencies began their work July 1.

Oregon exports increased every month from July through December, indicating better days for all business in this section.

PLANTING TIME FOR COUNTY AGENT

Because of the vital connection between the extension, department and the work of the agricultural adjustment administration of the federal government, the services of the county agent have tripled. He is working like the trooper he is to bring the new benefits of the new deal to every farmer. Fortunate is Malheur county to be among those counties with a capable agent upon its staff of workers—because he knows conditions here and is going right ahead. We might call it planting time as he is sowing the seeds of information every day.

Having contracted with wheat producers for the allotment plan, this first month of the new year will bring checks for the rental of idle acres. The farmer who does not share is he who did not wish to curtail production—or the occasional farmer who could not be interested.

Next on the program is the corn-hog control plan which will be put into effect without delay. If the growers does not share in these new benefits, it is his fault as our county agent spares no effort in bringing the new set-up to every farmer—regardless of whether he owns an acre of ground or a hundred.

Much responsibility is placed upon extension agents all over the state in bringing to Oregon farmers the benefits of the various federal efforts in behalf of agriculture. The county agent is proving a very useful man. He is a spoke in the wheel of the new deal.
