HOMESTEAD LAND WILL BE SURVEYED

INCOME TAX TIME ROLLS AROUND

The 1933 Federal income tax blanks were mailed January 2nd, and should reach taxpayers within the week. The requirements for filing individual returns are the same as for the year 1932: each single person with a net income of \$1000 or over and each married person with a net income of \$2500 or over, or each person with a gross income of \$5,000 or over must file an income tax return.

If separate returns are filed by husband and wife, the exemption may be taken by either or divided between them. In addition to the personal exemption, a credit of \$400 may be claimed for each dependent.

Before preparing the return, the taxpayer should assemble carefully all information; he also should make a study of the instructions on the form. When the return has been completed, all working papers should be held by the taxpayer for future reference.
