Apple Valley packing house, on the Idaho side, completed the season's shipment of apples last week with the loading of the 179th car of apples. Ten cars were shipped to foreign countries, the balance to midwest and eastern buyers.

From October until last week, an average of 44 people were employed during most of the packing season. Two tables were operated with full crews of 22 each working most of the time.
