GRANGE RAPS RATE CHANGE

**MALHEUR COUNTY GRANGE
FEARS LOWER RATE FROM MID-
WEST TO COAST POINTS.**

Fearing that the proposed reduction in freight rates on shipments from the mid-west to the Pacific coast will injure local producers, unless a corresponding reduction is made in the local rates, the Malheur Pomona grange has passed a resolution opposing the mid-western reduction, according to C. E. Peck, rancher and veteran granger of Big Bend. The resolution follows:

Whereas, the railroads are seeking an amendment to, or an abrogation of, certain sections of the Interstate Commerce law, which will permit them to reduce freight rates from the east and middle west to our Pacific coast terminals, and

Whereas, representatives of the railroads are calling on Chambers of Commerce, Commercial clubs and other organizations of our western cities and towns, endeavoring to enlist the support of those organizations in securing this reduction in rates, and

Whereas, at least some of those organizations have given the railroads assurance of their support in securing this concession, and

Whereas, a reduction in rates from the east and middle west to hogs corn and other agricultural products to Pacific coast terminals without a reduction from our northwest territory to the coast terminals, would be ruinous to our already sadly depleted markets.

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Malheur County Pomona Grange, That: This Grange is opposed to any reduction in freight rates from the east and middle west to Pacific Coast terminals without a corresponding reduction in rates from all northwest territory to those terminals.

CHRISTMAS SEAL SALE SHOWS GAIN

Malheur county residents purchased \$279.53 in Christmas Seals, final figures announced Monday by Mrs. M. C. Imbler, county chairman, show. This is about \$80 more than last year's total.

"Much credit," said Mrs. Imbler, "is due the teachers of the county, the district chairman and others who gave so generously of their time and interest in helping make this increase possible."

The amounts raised in the various communities were as follows: Vale \$53.90; Nyssa \$44.10; Ontario \$99.17; rural schools and country districts \$82.36.

Money realized from the sale of Christmas Seals is used to carry on the educational work of the Oregon Tuberculosis association in its fight on tuberculosis. More than the amount raised is returned to the county each year through the work of Miss Edna Flanagan, public health nurse, who spends several months here in the schools. The local seal committee of which Mrs. Imbler is chairman, is planning to ask the state association to allot funds again for Miss Flanagan's services next fall.
