BLACK CANYON FITS INTO THE PICTURE

Last week an Associated Press dispatch from Washington said: Purchase and withdrawal from cultivation of seven million acres of unprofitable farm land by July 1 is a goal set by Administration officials who are attempting to find a place for stranded populations—rural and urban.

Thousands—many thousands—of people will, with their consent, be transferred to better farming areas. And here is where completion of the second unit of the Black Canyon project should fit into the picture.

In an address before Congress, delivered January 4, President Roosevelt frankly reminded us that he was confronted with the problem of what the Government is to do with 5,000,000 unemployed now on relief rolls. The President recalled that about 1,500,000 of these people belong to a group that in the past had been improvident and dependent upon local welfare efforts. In explaining his plans of providing work for the 3,500,000 (representing upwards of 15,000,000 months) that must continue to receive federal aid until absorbed by industry the President declared that "all work given out to these people should be of useful character—not just useful for a day or a year, but useful in the sense that it affords permanent improvement in living conditions and

creates future new wealth for the nation."

From the foregoing analysis by the President how splendidly the completion of the Black Canyon projects suits the program. In all the west there is no other undertaking of greater merit from either a federal or local viewpoint. And, since the Government already has a material investment therein, failure to bring about completion will be the best evidence that we—our people collectively—have not been fully awake to our opportunities.—Caldwell News-Tribune.
