SALES TAX GETS ANOTHER WALLOP

The sales tax advocates have just received another wallop on the chin with the announcement that Harry L. Hopkins of the emergency relief administration has set aside fifteen million dollars with which to pay the salaries of school teachers in rural districts throughout the nation which are temporarily embarrassed thru the delinquency of taxes. Notice To Voters

TO VOTE YOU MUST BE REGISTERED

AS PROVIDED by Chapter 204, 1927 Laws, no person shall be qualified to vote at a Primary or General Election unless he shall be registered.

Electors cannot be sworn in to vote on election day. Registration books are now open and will be open until the night of April 17. If you were registered and did not

vote at the last Primary or General Election; if you have changed your residence or if you desire to change your political affiliations you must re-register.

You may register at the office of the County Clerk, for any precinct in the County, or with the official registrars in the following precincts.

DAVE GRAHAM TELLS THEM, SAYS TIMES

HERE'S HOW, CANDIDATES

David F. Graham, county judge at Malheur, eastern Oregon, must have read a recent comment in The Nest in which we despair of a candidate of sufficient candor to state in his platform his real reasons for running. Says Graham in his announcement that he will seek the republican nomination in the second congressional district: "I am running because I would like the job—it pays much more than the one I now have—and I believe that I could actually fill it with credit to all concerned, the district, the state, the nation and myself." Judge Graham continues.

"I would support the president as long as I felt that he was right; I believe he is bigger than any party and is striving honestly to make things better. I favor measures covering unemployment insurance, old age pensions, the continuance of the guaranty of bank deposits, development of rivers; also the increase of taxes on income and inheritance in the higher brackets for the purpose of revenue; and I would like to see the government help with education. I could promise many things, but it would be foolish. I simply say I will work hard for my district all the time if nominated and elected."

Isn't that a salty, packed-down, honest statement as a candidate could make? It reveals a man who is kidding no one, least of all himself. Yet we can't predict success at the polls for the judge. He's too forthright. He'll not promise the voters everything they want and he'll antagonize various cliques by his frankness.

We know Judge Graham too well; he's too well-read, to trenchant in his thinking, too courageous in his outspokenness. That is, he is too much of all these qualities to make a good candidate. The public really wants to be told a lot of things it knows upon reflection, can never be true.

Note: We have our "doots" about the Times opinion of the public and predict that our Dave will make a good race with the lawyer from Bend, State Senator Jay Upton, one of the sponsors of the sales tax bill.
