PEA PICKERS HARD AT WORK ON LARGE CROP

FIRST CROP IN NYSSA REGION IS PRODUCING ABUNDANTLY; CREWS AT WORK HERE AND IN APPLE VALLEY.

Close to 400 people are picking peas in this vicinity, around 200 on this side of the river where F. H. Hogue has an early crop of 100 acres and approximately the same number on the Idaho side where the San Diego Fruit and Produce company has a large acreage contracted.

Matured several weeks earlier than usual, the pea crop is said to be better than last year. Good crops aid workers as well as growers as they are paid by the hamper. In spite of the large number already employed, it is said more can be used.
