Nyssa scored the first no-hit, no-run game of the Idaho-Oregon league season in Nampa Sunday when the locals shut out the Idaho boys to the tune of 4 to 0.

Dean Johnston, youthful Nyssa southpaw, had the Nampa batters helpless throughout. One Nyssa error and two walks put the only three Idaho batters on base. Of these Robinson stole second but died there and was the only Nampa to get farther than the first sack. Nihart pitched well for Nampa but his support was wobbly in the pinches. The result was three of the four Nyssa runs were classed as unearned.

Dean struck out 17 batters, leaving only 10 putouts during the game to his fielders. Nihart struck out 11.

Max Schweizer, another young player on the local team, got the only extra base hit of the game, a pretty two-base hit.

COUNCIL FAVORS WILSON DITCH

LICENSE FEE FOR POOLHALLS IS
FIXED AT \$12.50 PER MONTH.
FIRE EQUIPMENT DISCUSSED.

It has been proposed that city property owners tie in with the Owyhee irrigation district for the purpose of providing the city with an additional supply of irrigation water. The project was discussed at length at the regular meeting of the city council on Monday night, but in the end councilmen expressed the opinion that the Wilson ditch will supply a sufficient run-off for any additional city irrigation at a lower cost.

It was reported that some difficulty was experienced in getting fire fighting equipment into action at the Hatfield fire Friday night so Mayor Howard Larsen appointed Ted Newell to confer with Chief Sid Burbridge in regard to improvements in the equipment and service that might be made. Burbridge plans to hold a series of meetings when certain members of the volunteer fire department will be assigned to certain positions.

The council set the license rates for poolhalls at \$12.50 per month.

HARLAN HERE ON DAIRY CONTROL

With a view to tightening up regulations under which milk may be sold to the public, E. G. Harlan, chairman of the Oregon Milk Control Board, was here from Portland most of this week. The board requires certain sanitary regulations, licenses dairies and will make an effort to prohibit the sale of "bootleg milk" Harlan said.

Harlan favors a uniform rate on milk and has suggested that the minimum be fixed at 10 cents per quart, effective in July. "Frequently the public is particular about its water supply, but careless about the source of milk, a germ carrier under adverse condition," said Harlan.

WESTFALL RANCHER SHOOTS SON IN QUARREL FRIDAY

J. M. RANDLEMAN CONFESSES
SLAYING BUT CLAIMS SELF-
DEFENSE, SURRENDERS TO SHER-
IFF.

J. M. Randleman, aged rancher of Westfall, shot and killed his son Jess, 40, Friday morning as the climax to a quarrel which began at breakfast. The elderly rancher then walked to the Westfall store and informed Wm. Ader that he had quarreled with his son. Ader found the body of the son with a rifle bullet through his neck. The kitchen was strewn with broken dishes, Randleman alleging that the son threw the dishes at him and attacked him with a cobbler's stand before he grabbed the rifle and fired the fatal shot. Randleman said the quarrel started when he proposed the return of another son to the ranch.

Accompanied by Ader and J. L. Lamberson, also of Westfall, Randleman drove to Vale and surrendered to Sheriff C. W. Glenn. A coroner's jury consisting of Val Becker, Taylor Johnson, Oliver Sandy, Wm. Woodward, Roy Stewart and Cleve Camman held the elderly man responsible for the shooting.

Randleman was held on an open charge. At the preliminary hearing Saturday, bail was not fixed.

HATFIELD HOME BURNS ON FRIDAY

While John Hatfield was absent from his home Friday evening, fire of unknown origin set the interior of his 4-room residence ablaze. The fire was beyond control when noticed by neighbors who were returning from the show given by the Arizona Wranglers. Firemen saved buildings nearby but the Hatfield frame dwelling and its contents burned to the ground. The loss was partly covered by insurance.

SHIPPERS BATTLE FOR LOW FREIGHT

The railroads have proposed the removal of the emergency freight rate on potatoes which in effect would increase the rate on shipments from this district to Mississippi valley points 9 cents per hundred, or approximately \$35 on every car. At the instigation of shippers of this territory, bankers, civic organizations and growers have forwarded the following telegram to F. A. Leland, of the freight bureau in St. Louis:

"We must demand present emergency on potatoes, apples, onions from Idaho and southeastern Oregon be maintained and remain the same."

Southern Idaho Shippers association is leading the opposition to any raise in freight rates, reports L. E. Stephens who lined up forces here.

Showers Help Crops, Ranges Thruout County

Heavy showers in the valleys and on the range of Malheur county throughout the week are proving of much benefit to parched crops and grass. In many instances, the rain assures a crop from dry land wheat which was nearing the danger point.

Some danger to hay which was down is expected but this will be light if extra care is given before stacking. Rain has fallen at frequent intervals since Monday and the temperature has fallen noticeably after a long hot spell.

NORMAL GRADUATES THREE FROM NYSSA

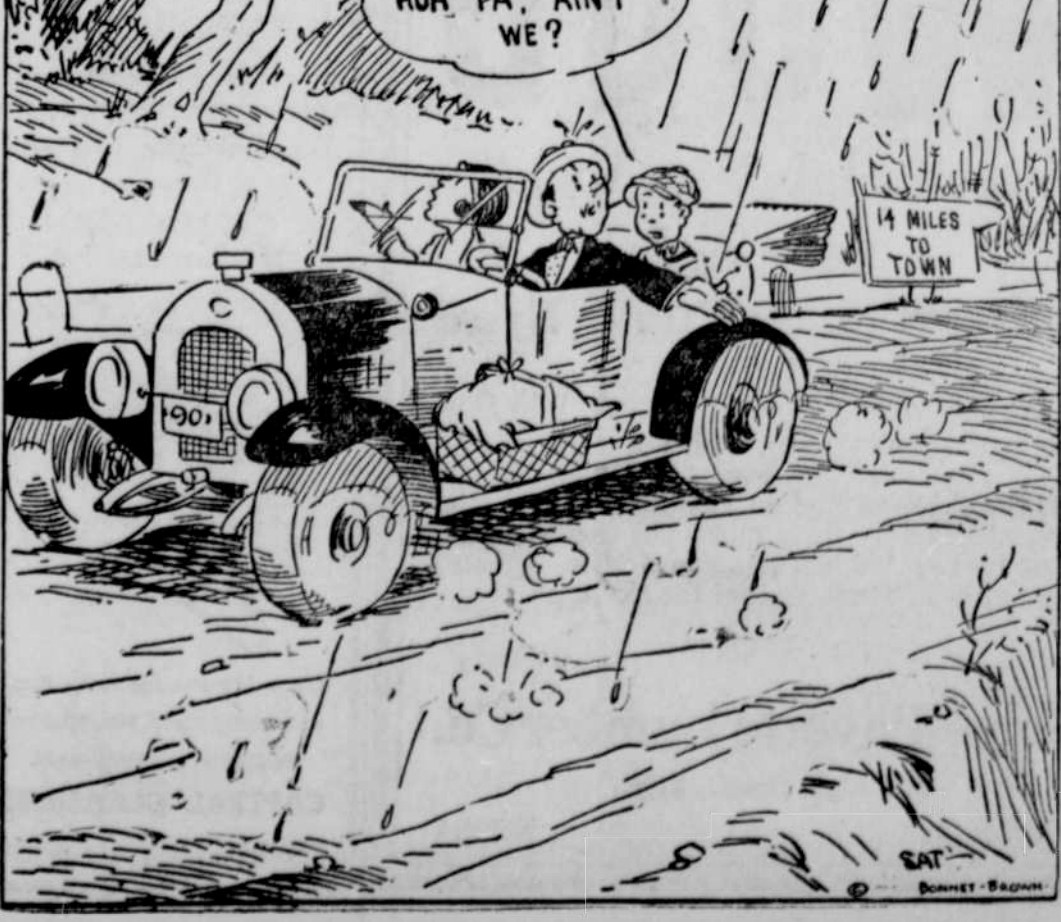

DELINQUENT TAX MAY BE PAID ON INSTALLMENT PLAN

SHERIFF GLENN REMINDS TAX-
PAYERS OF CHANGE IN TAX LAW
WHICH PROVIDES THAT DE-
LINQUENT TAXES CAN BE PAID
IN 10 INSTALLMENTS.

Oregon Laws, 1933, provide that delinquent taxes for 1930 and prior years may be paid in ten semi-annual installments beginning July 1, 1933. The law also compels the sheriff to forthwith issue certificates of delinquency, covering all such delinquent taxes, to the County and immediately proceed to foreclose the same whenever three installments of such delinquent taxes become past due. After certificates are issued all of the delinquent taxes covered by such certificates, that is, taxes for 1930 and prior years, must be paid if property is to be redeemed before the sale. This statement was issued to The Journal by Sheriff C. W. Glenn.

Taxpayers who have not commenced payment of delinquent taxes according to above plan or who have not paid an equivalent amount under the old plan of payment of half or all of the tax for any one year are urged to do so at once as the sheriff will be obliged to issue certificates after July 1st.

Taxpayers who are paying the 1934 taxes quarterly are reminded that the second quarter becomes delinquent after June 15th.

FLAMES DESTROY BRICK BUILDING AND EQUIPMENT

FIRE OF UNKNOWN ORIGIN PUTS
\$75,000 STRUCTURE IN RUINS;
FIREMEN SAVE FRAME GYMNAS-
IUM NEARBY.

Fanned by a high wind, fire of unknown origin destroyed the Nyssa grade and high school building last Thursday evening. Damage was estimated at \$75,000 less than half of which is covered by insurance. It was the most disastrous fire which has ever occurred in Nyssa and a crowd of several hundred people gathered around the blazing building.

The school term for several hundred students had ended the previous Friday and no one had been around the building for several hours, so school officials are at a loss to know how the fire started.

Noticed at 7 p. m.
Flames bursting out from the third story were first noticed by Dorothy Sales, little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Sales, who ran to the home of Dr. C. A. Abbott who had the nearest telephone. The fire department was at the schoolhouse in a moment but the entire third story was ablaze and it was impossible to check the flames. Within a few moments the whole interior was a roaring furnace. The high wind continued an hour or more. Hose lines were concentrated on the gymnasium close by which would have burned had it not been for the efforts of local firemen.

Terrific heat caused an entire wall of the brick structure to buckle and crumble, carrying with it one of the school's two fire escapes. One of three chimneys also collapsed, strewn bricks and chunks of mortar over a wide area and endangering the crowd which surrounded the building.

Fortunately the door from the office into the hallway was closed, shutting out smoke and flames. As soon as the cornice burned away, Supt. Leo Hollenberg and a number of firemen broke into the office and removed valuable records, trophies and equipment. An effort was made to enter the lower hallway where athletic suits were stored but intense smoke and heat barred the way.

Rain Helps Some

Rain arrived about 9 o'clock to end the wind and aid firemen who were on guard for many hours. All books, desks, furniture and equipment were burned with the school building, however. The building was erected some 20 years ago and had been added to during the last 10 years until its original size was nearly doubled. Insurance amounted to about \$30,000. An adjuster was here yesterday.

MRS. MCINTYRE DIES TUESDAY

LONG ILLNESS CLAIMS AGED
MATRON WHO HAS RESIDED
HERE SEVERAL YEARS.

Funeral services were conducted by Rev. G. H. Ragsdale from the Pentecostal church this morning for Mrs. Carrie V. McIntyre, aged matron of Nyssa who passed away Tuesday evening after a long illness due to heart trouble. Mrs. McIntyre had been critically ill the past few weeks. She is survived by her husband Pat McIntyre, formerly of Owyhee dam who purchased a small chicken farm at the edge of town about a year ago. Burial was made in Nyssa cemetery.

EARLY DAHLIA BLOOMS

Weeks ahead of season, a pink dahlia bloomed for Mrs. Frank Leuck on June 1st. The bloom came from a volunteer plant. As a rule bulbs left in the ground will freeze during the winter but this year they survived and are budding at least a month ahead of season.
