ONTARIO-NYSSA IRRIGATION COMPANY ON SOUND BASIS

On July 8, 1911, the Ontario-Nyssa Irrigation Company filed articles of incorporation. Since that time the Company has been active and has kept its machinery running and its land watered. About 90 farmers were included in this body and about 6,000 acres of good land were brought under cultivation.

An excellent pumping plant was built on the Snake river, with five pumps, a pipe line one and a quarter miles long, and a main line canal running north and west about twenty-two miles.
