GRANGE SPONSORS NEW SCHOOL LAW

The state grange is sponsoring a county school equalization measure which will be presented to the next legislature for its consideration. The measure is the Grange's substitute for the county unit which has been in effect in Oregon since 1921 and to which the Grange is opposed, although its adoption will have no effect on operation of the county unit law in those counties which have already adopted it nor will it prevent any county from adopting the county unit law.

The essential difference between the two measures, as analyzed by C. A. Howard, state superintendent of public instruction, is found in the fact that the Grange proposal is confined to an attempt to equalize the cost of public school education between the various districts in a county while the county unit law, in addition to this feature also seeks to introduce greater efficiency and economy into school administration by centering authority in a single county board with jurisdiction over all schools in the county except those in districts of the first class. It is this centralization of control to which the Grange takes exception, in the county unit law, insisting, rather, that direction of school affairs such as the hiring of teachers, be left in the hands of district boards.

While the new proposal is distinctly a Grange creation administrative features of the measure were worked out in co-operation with officials of the state department of education who regard the program as a step in the right direction even if it does not go as far as the county unit law.
