The Oregon Milk Control Board created by an act of the last legislature has set the following minimum retail prices on milk and cream in Malheur County effective July 1st, 1934.

MILK
4 per cent milk, quarts 10c, pints 6c
5 per cent milk, quarts 11c, pints 6½c
6 per cent milk, quarts 12c, pints 7c
Processed milk, 1c more per quart
Gallons, in cans 35c

Whipping cream, 33 to 36 per cent
½ pints 10c, pints 20c, quarts 50c
Table cream, 20 to 22 per cent B. F.
½ pint 13c, pints 21c, quarts 35c
Buttermilk, Bulgarian or culture
Quarts 10c, Gallons 35c

We are putting these prices into effect on that date.
